QUEBEC, June 9. One of the most destructive fires with which this unfortunate city has ever been afflicted, commenced last night, and is only now under control, at 6 a. m. The first alarm was from the corner of Oliver and St. Clair streets at ten minutes before 11 o'clock. onsiderable delay must have occurred in giving this alarm, for on turning the eve in the direction indicated by the number of the box, the lurid glare of flames was readily discernable, and minute later the bells from the Basilica, St. John's and St. Roch's churches rang out the second alarm. The whole torce of the brigade was soon upon the ground.
