The most valuable natural bridge in the world is to be found in Arizona, lying across a deep chasm forty feet in width. It is a petrified tree about four feet in diameter and about 100 feet in length. It is pure agate all through and therefore is much more valuable as regards material than any bridge of marble or granite would be. But the most expensive material of which a bridge has ever been built is probably telegraph wire. One was built over the Jhelum River at Kohala, in the Funjab, in the place of a bridge which was swept away by the floods in 1892. A similar bridge was constructed during the first Sondan campaign over the Kokora River for military purposes.
