The robing of the bride was performed according to court custom, in the private apartments of the Empress. She was dressed by the Empress and the Dowager Empress, assisted by their maids of honor and ladies-in-waiting.

A salute of twenty-one guns and a blare of trumpets announced the start of the procession. At the head came the Dowager Empress, on the arm of King Gustave; the Emperor of Russia, escorted by Queen Olga of Greece, the Empress escorted by the Grand Duke of Hesse, Crown Prince Ferdinand and Crown Princess Marie of Roumania, attended by the court ushers and marshals and other functionaries.

Then arm in arm came the bridal pair and behind them marched Prince Nicholas and Prince Andrew of Greece and their wives, Prince Christopher of Greece and Prince Carl of Sweden and his wife and the guests from foreign courts and the Russian grand dukes and grand duchesses.

The imperial guests were received at the chapel doors by the Metropolitan of the court, and a number of priests. After the Emperor had been blessed and sprinkled with holy water he conducted the bridal pair to the altar.

The wedding rings were brought from the altar on golden salvers and placed upon the fingers of the bride and the bridegroom by the Emperor's confessor. The Metropolitan then completed the rites of the Russian marriage services, two of the bride's nearest relatives holding gowns over the heads of the bridal pair during the ceremony. While the Tsar was being chanted an Imperial salute of 101 guns was fired. The procession
