FACTS OF IMPORT-ANCE TO THE VOTERS

OTTAWA, Oct. 19-(By Canadian Press)-The coming general election will be the first in Canada which has een held since the abolition of the office of the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery. Provision was made, in recently amending the Dominion Elec tions Act, for abolition of that office, and the appointment instead of Col. O. M. Biggar, of Ottawa, as Chief Electoral Officer, as set forth in the

A section of the Act governing ourt procedures under the Act pro vides that "no person may be requir ed to state for whom he voted" in my proceedings which may arise.

Penalties are provided in the act or persons guilty of illegal- or corrupt practices at elections. Sections 86 of the Act provides that: "Any person who during an election commits a corrupt practice or an illegal practice shall ipso facto become disqualified from voting and incompet ent to vote at such election. He shall also in addition to any other punish ment for such offence by this or any other Act prescribed, forfeit to any person who in any competent court shall therefore sue:

"(a) For every corrupt practice committed the sum of two hundred dollars and costs: and

"(b) For every illegal practice com mitted the sum of one hundred dollars and costs."



The preservation of the home market by a Reasonable Protective Tariff is vital to both city dweller and agrarian alike-now as never before. More capital is urgently needed for the development of Canada's enormous resources, which will result in a lessening of unemployment and an increased population. More work and more workers will produce an enlarged home market for products of both city and farm, and the exodus of Canadian men and women-and the dollars they earn-will be precluded.

The United States has slammed her trade door in the face of Canadian farmers by adopting the Fordney Bill, and the farmer is consequently now even more dependent upon the home market than in the past.

Yet Crerar asks you to destroy that home market by voting for Free Trade.
