

LOCAL AND SPECIAL NEWS.

The Liberal-Conservatives of Halifax are entertaining Sir John Macdonald at a political picnic today.

A BRICKMAKER on the Halifax Eastern Extension Railway while looking over the car platform struck his head against the corner of Piquette's Bridge and was killed.

The President of the United States issued an order on the 14th inst., making Major General Schofield Commander-in-chief of the army, with headquarters at Washington.

The St. John Telegraph of a late date says that 41 horses were brought over from P. E. Island a few days ago, but that number only eleven now remain.

A despatch received a few days ago reports that the brig Zetis, Captain W. Marchbanks, belonging to Pease Bros. & Co., from Bahia for New York, had been wrecked at Natal, Brazil. The crew were saved.

The Government immigration agent at Halifax, reports that there was a large influx of immigrants during July. The arrivals in that month reached 400, which did not include any paupers.

Two letter box thieves named Berk and McKivree were arrested in Chicago on the 14th inst. They have been stealing money letters for over two years, and it is estimated that the amount they have taken exceeds one million dollars.

A YOUNG man named Frank McGilivray fell from the main rigging of the schooner "William" on the 14th inst. While falling his head struck the railing of the vessel and he was thrown into the water. When picked up he was dead.

Wants a working train was shunting at Salisbury Station, N. B., on Wednesday last, a boy fell off a car and was run over by the train, his leg being cut off. It is understood that a lot of boys, the one injured among the number, were playing about the cars and had been warned off several times.

On Tuesday a policeman in Chicago, while travelling on his beat, picked up a gas-pipe dynamite bomb on the track of the "C" Railway. The bomb was six inches long, 1 1/2 inches in diameter, and contained dynamite enough to blow up an entire train. There is no clue as to who placed the explosive on the track.

Yellow fever is spreading rapidly in Cuba and Florida. A despatch from St. Jago states that up to the present there have been twenty deaths from the disease in the city, and that reports from the country show an increased number of deaths and new cases.

An official bulletin issued in Jacksonville, Florida, states that there have been twenty-eight new cases and four deaths to date.

The shipment of mackerel from P. E. Island, this year, is very small in comparison with former years. Not more than 200 barrels have been received at the L. C. R. freight shed during this month, while during the same month of former years about 300 barrels per day would be received.

JOHN PETER, a hotel keeper of Ontario Landing, P. Q., was murdered on the 15th inst. by a travelling agent named H. Case. There was a quarrel going on between the hotel keeper's son and the agent, and Peter interfered and the agent was frightened by a smoking engine and ran away, knocking the young lad down and inflicting two wounds in his head with his hood. The cuts required fourteen stitches. The servant who found his master on the ground had his hands badly hurt, and received internal injuries.

The Prix List for the Provincial Exhibition to be held in Charlottetown on the 3rd and 4th of October next, has been handed us. It contains, in addition to the list of prizes, the usual amount of information as to the rules and regulations governing the Exhibition, and the names of the Commissioners and the different committees.
