First Filipino Bishop.

The Manila Cablenews of June 29. the feast of SS. Peter and Paul, gives a sketch of Right Rev. Jorge Barlin Imperial, D. D., the first Filipino Bishop, who was consecrated that day and who now presides over the Diocese of Neuva Caceres. The Consecration was performed by the Papal Delegate, Mgr. Agius, assisted by Archbishop Harty and Bishops Rooker, Hendricks and Dougherty

Mgr Barlin's life's history is some what Romantic. He was set aside for the ministry by his mother from youth, and specially trained under the direction of the Bishop. His mother one day appeared before the Gaizan with her child in her arms and offered him to the Bishop as an offering to the Church. The Bishop ocepted her offering in the name of the Church, and as soon as the little one had grown into years and was the duties of the position and served as acolyte till able to take his first studies under his reverend master. 
