Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency of Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions Duties-Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteade. may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre -emption. Price \$3.00 per acre Duties-Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead datent and cultivate 50 acres extra as bomestead patent on certain con

A settler after obtaining homeste patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emp ion, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 pe acre. Must reside tix months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and
