But just think of having a capital city where the hunting for big game is good on the main thoroughfare. The moose at the Pioneer market was slain on or about the 15th of December, on the main thoroughfare of Edmonton.

"In the long since dead years, twenty of them past, Calgary was stagnant, lost to progress was it that a small gather built its home on Ninth avenue and history has since made much of it. But never can it be said that moose ranged the main thoroughfare at the west end by the big game hunters of the city. No longer will it be necessary for sportsmen to purchase big hunting outfits, hire guides and study maps. Now if a man wants to kill moose, all he will have to do is to buy a ticket to Edmonton, borrow a rifle and walk down Jasper avenue.

NEW ERA IN NICARAGUA.

General Estrada Purposes Introducing Many Modern Reforms. Washington, Jan. 3.—General Estrada today obliterated party lines in his address to the people of Nicaragua and pledged that his administration will be national in scope.

Among the reforms suggested were the construction of a railway to the Atlantic and a reduction in the import duties and the abolition of export taxes.

The Minister of War, General Diaz has issued an official order for the pardoning of all the prisoners of war in the Nicaragua campaign who had been held during the regime of Zelaya and Madrid.

INQUEST SUSPENDED DEC. 20 BY WITHDRAWAL OF JURYMEN IS RESUMED. Bellevue, Alta., via Hillcrest, Alta., Jan. 3.—The coroner's inquest into the cause of the death of the thirty-one miners in the Bellevue mine, which occurred on the night of December 17, 1910, was resumed today.

The inquiry into which was suspended on the twentieth of December, because of the refusal of two jurors to go on in the case, was resumed today. A new jury of ten men was sworn in and the evidence of James Burke, secretary of Bellevue, was taken.

TRIAL OF FISK FOR MURDER OF PEACH

PRELIMINARY HEARING OF OKOTOKS MURDER CASE OPENS IN CALGARY. Calgary, Jan. 3.—The preliminary hearing of J. C. Fisk, charged with the murder of Tucker Peach, was commenced at the Mounted Police Barracks before Colonel Walker.

The trial will last about ten days. There are 22 witnesses to be examined, including Fisk and Robertson, each of the latter witnesses to be on the stand a couple of days, it is expected.

Sat Immovable. Fisk sat through the examination absolutely immovable save for his eyes fixed on the wall. Later in the cross-examination Mr. Nolan called the witness to the stand to identify him as the man hired to take care of the horses, and when Robertson said he did not know Fisk, he simply smiled a couple of times and paid not the slightest attention to the man who was accusing him of a most heinous crime.

Dr. Revell's Evidence. Dr. Revell, cross-examined by Mr. Nolan, said the head and body did not fit owing to a portion of the vertebrae being missing. Asked by Mr. Nolan if he was prepared to say that the head and body were not of the same person, Dr. Revell replied: "There is nothing incompatible."

32 Bullets Used. Dr. Revell could not say how long the body had been in the water. He pointed out that the bullets were caused by a fire from a distance of three or four feet, or twenty yards.

THE FIRST EXAMINATION. Dr. Nebbett told the first examination of the body. Decomposition had set in long since and such an advanced stage had been reached that it was impossible to make more than a superficial examination of the body.

WHITEFISH HATCHERY AT POINT NEAR CITY

This is One of the Recommendations of the Fisheries Commission Who Recently Held a Sitting Here—To Investigate North Nest. Dr. Sisley states that the report of the commission was received with favor by Hon. L. P. Brodeur, the minister. When the report was given the minister, the commission stated that the conditions in the west were serious and needed immediate attention.

Some Recommendations. The regulations include licenses for all fishermen, the limit of catches and the size of fish. Hatcheries are recommended for whitefish at some points near Edmonton, Prince Albert and Qu'Appelle, and for cutthroat trout at Banff or some other suitable point.
