THE CANADIAN CENSUS RESULT AMNOUNCED

The Population of Canada is Fixed at 7,081,896 — Alberta Will Get Twelve Members—Eastern Provinces Fall Off, the Western

Ottawa, Oct. 17-Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, tonight gave out to the press an official statement of the result of the census taking which is now practically complete. The figures show a population of 7,081,869 for Canada as compared with 5,371,315 in 1901, an increase of 1,710,554. It was estimated that the population of Canada would be about eight millions so that the figures will the people of the Dominion.

As compared with the increase population in the 1891-1901 decade the figures are satisfactory. In ten years preceding 1901, Canada's population iffereased by only 538,076; as compared with this the betterment increase of 1,710,554 in the past years is large but it is not nearly satisfactory as was expected. Of the previnces Saskatchew shows the largest ratio of increa having jumped in population fr 91,279 to 453,508 while Alberta con and with an increase of from 022 to 372,919 in the decade. Quebec Beats Ontario.

The Province of Quebec shows increase in population of 351,7 while Ontario has increased by 33 955, British Columbia increased 184,109 and Manitoba by 149,480. The provinces down by the sea ha all fallen away in population, N Scotia showing a decline of 2,27 New Brunswick 20,795 and Prince ward Island 10,537.

Montreal shows the largest crease in population of any city in Dominion and continues to mainte its position as the most metropolit centre. The total population of city is 466,197, as against 267,730 years ago, an increase of 198,467. cluding Westmount, Maisonneuve a Verdun, Montreal has a population 510,811, or a comfortable marg over a half million mark.

Toronto is in second place, grow from 208,048 to 376,240 in 1911, increase of 168,200. Vancouver jumped from 27,010 100,333 and Winnipeg from 42,340 135,430, increase of 93,090. The population of Halffax is 48,0 an increase of 5,249 in the decade

Hankow, Oct, 18-A general engagement between the revolutionary army and imperial forces was precipitated on the waterfront here early today by the attempt of Admiral She Chen Ping to land a large body of troops for the reinforcement of General Chang Pise, who, although officially dismissed by the Pekin government, still retains command. The revolutionary army was entrenched with several

guns of the old provincial army, at a point in the native city close to the foreign concessions. It was just daybreak when Admiral She ordered the cruisers to disembark soldiers near General Chang Pise's position. The revolutionists on the Wu Chang fortifications immediately detected the

movement and opened a hot fire Wit's their artillery. The cruisers and gunbouts in the river replied with a rain of shells which diverted the attention of the Wu Chang artillerymen, and effectually covered the landing of the troops. Scattered bodies of revclutionists on both sides of the river joined in the fighting and by midforenoon it was estimated that 2,000 imperial troops and nearly 10,000

rebels were engaged. The warships used up a large quantity of ammunition, but the effectiveness of the fire was hampered by fear of endangering the foreign concessions. All the foreign warships in the river sent landing paraties ashore for the protection of foreign interests.
