The ship easily did 14 1/2 knots though her contract called for but 14. The crew of the Mongolian saw her as she was making her trial runs and say she is a splendid boat. She left the Clyde for New York on the 10th and it is believed she is there now though Bowring Bros. had no word of her arrival.

**Goes to Cartwright.**

Rev. C. H. Kirby, accompanied by his wife, arrived here by the S. S. Prospero and we learn, has volunteered for service at Cartwright and neighborhood on the Labrador to which place he will proceed in July as missionary. Rev. Mr. Kirby has the past 4 years been stationed at himself to the people of whom expressed sincere regret at the severing of the ties which bound the pastor to his people. The Rev. Gentleman's father was a missionary for years in the far north and filled with the zeal his son has volunteered to reside in future on the bleak Labrador coast in a section where there is much work to be done. Mrs. Kirby who graduated as a trained nurse will gladly second the efforts of her devoted husband in the mission.

After the ceremony a reception was held at the residence of the bride's parents and was attended by a large number of the friends of both. **The Mongolian Here.**

The s.s. Mongolian, Capt. Peters, arrived here at 11 a.m. yesterday from Liverpool. She left there on the 15th inst. and for the better part of the voyage had fair weather until Saturday evening when, owing to dense fog, she had to run at very slow speed, but for which she would have arrived here at 10.30 Saturday night. **LONDON, To-day.**  
The Roman Catholic and Free Churches of London as well as those of the Church of England, held Coronation Thanksgiving Services. That at the Roman Catholic Cathedral of Westminster was usually impressive as it was the first opportunity for more than two centuries that Roman Catholics had of joining their fellow-countrymen in rejoicing at the Coronation of a Monarch without a feeling of resentment that the dead-hand of bygone prejudice made the occasion one of condemnation of the central tenet of their faith.

He has got away in the woods, but the police feel confident that they will bring him back.

**House Burnt Down.**

The residence of Mr. J. James, on the corner of Cockpit Road and Cornwall Avenue, caught fire to-day shortly before noon and was burned clean to the ground in half an hour. A phone call brought out the Central and West End men, but as they could get no water nearer than from the Lunatic Asylum which was too far distant to be availed of, only the chemical could be used. Thomas O'Brien was mainly instrumental in helping to save the furniture, most of which was got out, including a piano. Mr. James who formerly did a crockery business on Water Street, and is a brother of Rev. Mr. James, had no insurance on the house and is therefore a heavy loser.
