OPEN TO CROWDED HOUSE
SPLENDID PERFORMANCE.

When it became known a short while ago that the Klark-Urban Theatrical Company were about to pay St. John's a visit our citizens who remembered their first appearance with so much pleasure felt assured that something good was in store for them this time. They were not disappointed in witnessing the performance of last night. Seldom have we seen such a large audience in the T. A. Theatre, and not often have we seen such an appreciative one, and rarely have an aggregation acquitted themselves so well as these actors and actresses did in the play selected for presentation—Higgins' sparkling comedy drama—"Capt. Clay of Missouri." Knowing that the company had only reached the city by the express at 5 o'clock yesterday evening and that its personnel must necessarily be fatigued, such a fine delineation of the drama could not be expected, but the Klark-Urban Co. rose to the occasion and upheld its reputation for good work. The drama in itself, the plot of which is laid in the State of Missouri, is of absorbing interest, and from the rise to the fall of the curtain the beholder's attention is centered in it as the plot reveals itself. It abounds in thrilling situations and exciting climaxes, yet withal there runs through it a feature of comedy which relieves the pathos so evident in the general tenor of the composition. The title role was handled in an inimitable manner by Mr. Harden Klark who was repeatedly greeted with much applause, while Missie Cecil, as the heroine, Millesy Benton, has not lost any of her popularity in St. John's, and was heartily welcomed before the footlights. Good work was done by Messrs. Schroeder, Urban, Pendikter, Webb, Field, Kenneth and Roberts in their various characters, and as to the rest of the ladies Misses Hunt, Hodgkins and Leith, they depicted themselves in a manner which demonstrated the histrionic ability they possess. Frank Urban has not forgotten how to make an audience laugh, and his sallies of last night kept the house in roars. So much for the play itself. The specialties alone were well worth the admission fee. The feats on the tight rope received much applause. Klark, Urban and Schriber gave surprisingly sweet musical selections on the merubaphone, shakaphone and with a number of cow bells of different tones. Miss Hodgkins gave a clever delineation of a hayseed's description of the performance of Uncle Tom's Cabin, and was repeatedly encored. Taken all round the performance was one of the best ever witnessed here and we bespeak for the Klark-Urban Co. a most successful season.

Wild Scene in Town in Italy.

Rome, Oct. 16, via Frontier—Very grave disorders occurred to-day at Segni, a town of 7,000 people one half hour by railway from Rome, and the centre of a district in which is Carpineto, the birthplace of Pope Leo XIII, still surrounded with the ruins of towers erected in the middle ages for protection against the Saracens.

The rioting was caused, as was the case in Calabria, recently by the action of the municipality in adopting the measures to stamp out the cholera.

Put Carbiniers to Flight.

There were five patients at the hospital and four suspects are quarantined in a house. The inhabitants believed that the Government intended to poison the cholera patients, and a great crowd marching to the City Hall demanded their release. There were only four Carbiniers in the place and when they attempted to defend the building, they were stoned, wounded and put to flight.

The Mayor Escaped.

Later they returned only to be again routed. They did not use their weapons, as they would have been of little avail against the mob, which by that time had been swollen until it numbered several thousand, practically the whole population.

The mob broke in the doors of the municipal building, seeking the Mayor, whom they held primarily responsible. However, the Mayor and his clerks had made good their escape, and found refuge with friends in a house where they could not be found. Failing to find hold of the Mayor the mob sacked the building and burned it.

Death to the Doctors.

The sight of the flames appeared to add to the frenzy of the rioters, and when a woman seizing the municipal flag from the burning structure cried "to the hospital, to the hospital; death to the doctors," the suggestion caught the fancy of the crowd and in another moment the thousands of shrieking and gesticulating men, women and children were bearing down on the hospital. The doors were forced, the attendants swept aside and the cholera patients lifted from their cots and carried to the street.

Embraced Cholera Patients.

Meantime others broke into the house where the suspects were quarantined and took them from the place. Something like a procession was then formed and the sick were borne in triumph to their homes. Of the nine stricken persons two were on the point of death, and it was a ghastly exhibition as they were passed from hand to hand, embraced, kissed and fondled by their half mad friends.

While this was going on some of the local authorities managed to send a message to Rome and troops were hurriedly sent from the Capital. The soldiers restored order after many of the mob had been placed under arrest.

Cabinet Changes.
LONDON, To-day.

The Cabinet has undergone an important reconstruction. Winston Churchill, the Home Secretary, becomes First Lord of the Admiralty. Reginald McKenna lays down the Admiralty portfolio to assume the Home Secretaryship. Earl Carrington, President of the Board of Agriculture, becomes Lord Privy Seal, Mr. C. E. Hobhouse, the Financial Secretary to the Treasury, has been appointed Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster. Mr. Walter Runciman retires from the Presidency of the Board of Education to become President of the Board of Agriculture. While the Presidency of the Board of Education has been assumed by Mr. G. A. Pease, Sir Edward Strachy becomes Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Agriculture. Mr. Alfred Emmott, the Deputy Speaker, has been promoted to the Peerage.

At Mount Cashel.

A very impressive ceremony took place this morning at Mount Cashel. At an early hour His Grace the Archbishop drove out to the institution and at 7.30 celebrated Mass in the little chapel, when about 100 of the boys received Holy Communion. After breakfast the little congregation again gathered together, and His Grace, robed in full canonicals, addressed the boys who were to be confirmed. In simple and touching language he explained the effects of the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation, incidentally praising the Brothers for their thorough manner, in which the boys had been grounded in the truths of religion. He also drew the attention of his hearers to the fact that this was the Feast of St. Raphael, and also patron of St. Cashel. On this day thirteen years ago the institution was dedicated with only two boys in the home. Now there are about one hundred and twenty clean, well-fed, well-cared for boys, enjoying more worldly and spiritual advantages than many children whose parents are living. After a little plain and homely instruction His Grace then administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to about 40 of the boys. When the ceremony of confirmation had been finished there was Benediction of the most Holy Sacrament. The orphan boys, trained by Rev. Bro. Eagan, and with Miss Mand Ryan presiding at the organ, sang the "O Salutaris," "Tantum Ergo" and "Come Holy Ghost." The boys sang beautifully and the ceremony was most impressive. His Grace was assisted by Rev. Dr. Greene. After Benediction His Grace raised the little fellows for their decorous manner, and especially for the beautiful and impressive way in which they sang the hymns of praise, and then mingled of the days when he was a boy himself and rambled through the glades at Mt. Cashel, he gave them a holiday, the announcement of which was received with acclamation.

Funeral of Mr. Hawker

All that was mortal of the late Mr. Hawker, J. P., was committed to mother earth on Sunday afternoon at 3 p.m. The cortege left the late residence of the deceased, headed by the Sunday school children, to whom he had long been devoted; then came the members of the Church of England Assistant Association to whom the departed had been much attached. Immediately preceding the hearse were the members of the L. O. A. to whom he was genuinely attached. Justice of Peace acted as bearers. After the hearse came those nearest akin to the deceased and then followed a large number of citizens. The route of the procession was along No. 1 Firebreak and up Church Hill to St. James's Church, where the Rev. Canon Cooley conducted the funeral service.

Dear Sir.—A correspondent in your issue of Thursday last drew especial attention to an advertisement which has been appearing in the daily newspapers for some weeks past over the signature of "F. C. Berteau, Acting Cashier," Newfoundland Savings Bank, and made some very pertinent observations respecting the manner in which the Directors of the Newfoundland Savings Bank propose to deal with the Rae Island property, which is one of the assets of the Bank. While there may be room for difference of opinion as to the best use to which the property may be applied, I think there can be no difference of opinion as to the sale by tender by which the Directors of the Savings Bank propose to part with the property. The desire of the Directors should be to obtain the highest possible price for the property. This they are not likely to obtain by tender. Out of the three Directors two are business men, namely, the Hon. John Harris and the Hon. John B. Ayre, and they certainly should be able to realize that sale by tender is likely to defeat their object, which must be to obtain the highest possible price for the property. Let me state a case. A B and C are anxious to become possessed of this property, and each tender at a figure that he considers fair value for the property. But B is prepared to go a higher figure than his competitors in order to secure the property. Under the tender system he has no opportunity to increase the amount of his bid, and the Savings Bank is consequently the loser. Then as Messrs. Harris and Ayre really desire to obtain the highest price for the Rae Island property, they have adopted a method of disposal that is likely to defeat their desire. There is another view to be taken of the matter. The tender system opens wide the door to favoritism, and even something worse than that. Two or more of the tenders may be equal, and in such event the Directors have to determine who shall have the property; or, supposing the tenders are not equal, the advertisement does not bind the Directors to accept the highest or any tender; they can do as they please.
