Outlook Improving.

The outlook is decidedly more cheering. It is now apparent that the main objective of the Teutonic drive in the East has not been reached, German strategy has failed as it failed twelve months ago in France. The strategy of twelve months ago was to destroy the French Army. That fail-The strategy of the movement of the past month was to destroy the Russian armies. Germany now admits that this objective has not been attained and that the taking of War-saw and the Polish salient is an indecisive event. The position therefore to-day is that the Teutons after their immense sacrifice of men have not accomplished either of the two tasks, which they declared it was essential should both be accomplished before last Christmas, and all the time Briis building up an immense army and manufacturing immense numbers of guns and enormous quantities of ammunition. The news too from the Dardanelles is encouraging. Fresh gains have been made and new landings effected.
