Woman Falls Over Cliff and is Drowned.

On Friday night at the little settlement of Freshwater Bay, just around the south head of St. John's Harbor, Mrs. Martin Baid met death by falling over a cliff a short distance from her home. As far as can be learned the woman left her house shortly after the evening meal to take in some clothes that were hanging on a line a short distance away. Mr. Baird, the husband of the missing woman, who had just returned from shooting rabbits and had retired for the night, asked his little boy where his mother was, and was informed that she was out taking in some clothes. Not giving the matter another thought, he again lay down to rest till 10 o'clock, when he became uneasy about his wife's absence, and fearing something unusual had happened, he got out of bed, put on his clothes and went out of doors, calling his wife by name but received no answer. He immediately secured a lantern and traced her footsteps in the snow to the edge of a steep cliff, where he was confronted with the awful fact that his partner in life had slid over the precipice into the sea and was carried out from the land into deep water by the heavy undertow. The horror-stricken man, realizing his wife was gone, called the neighbors to his assistance and searched the waters for some distance around but could not find any trace of the missing woman. The police were informed the next day and Sergt. Savage and Const. Whelan left here in a tug and dragged the bottom with a trawl on Saturday and Sunday, but were unsuccessful in their attempts. The deceased was 40 years of age and leaves a large family of seven children, the eldest being fifteen and the youngest an infant of four months. General sympathy will be expressed to the bereaved family, in which the Telegram joins.

Rhodes' Scholarship.

At a meeting of the Rhodes Selection Committee held at Government House last week, Mr. Harold S. Knight, son of Herbert Knight, Esq., Barrister, was selected Rhodes Scholar for 1917. Mr. Knight had a most distinguished career at St. Bonaventure's College winning many distinctions and honors in every grade of the C.B.R. examinations, finally finishing up his local scholastic triumphs by winning the Jubilee Scholarship of \$1,200.00. With this scholarship he proceeded to Dalhousie University where he has been for two years, keeping up there the character for ability which he so worthily earned here. During his two years at Dalhousie he has frequently led his class and with one exception has always appeared in the First Class, the highest in the University. Mr. Knight is now a member of the Nfld. Regiment and will, we expect, worthily sustain in its ranks the brilliant record he has already made in the schools. Mr. Knight will not proceed to Oxford till the close of the war. We extend cordial congratulations to Mr. Knight and wish him abundant success for the future.
