House of Assembly.

(Yesterday.)

The House met at 3.20. Following the reading of the minutes, and before the Orders of the Day had been called, Sir M. P. Cashin, member for Ferryland, rose in his seat and moved, "That the House adjourn until Friday afternoon next and that the Government as at present constituted, does not possess the confidence of the members of this House." In moving this resolution he traced the political events since August, 1917, when the National or Coalition Government was formed. His chief reasons for supporting this were: the war conditions, the regiment, conscription, the financial condition of the colony, loans, etc. With the unexpected consummation of the signing of the armistice the plans of the National Government had been upset, and the goal of its ambitions was reached with the ending of the war. No need existed to-day for the continuation of the Government, and it were better were they to get back to pre-war conditions. He had to be frank and state that there was no confidence existing between the factions comprising the Government. As

the senior member of the House on the Government side, he deemed it proper of him to make the motion of 'want of confidence." He then went to some length to warn the country to economize. Referring to the problems yet to be dealt with, he spoke of the Bowring Coastal Contract, predicting larger subsidies and much higher passenger and freight rates. The Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. Sir W. F. Lloyd, spoke next. Sir M. P. Cashin had handed him his resignation a

few minutes before. He agreed that there was no desire for the parties to work together. However, there was no necessity for the vote of want of confidence. He did not wish to remain Premier, and his resignation had been handed to the Governor. Speaking for himself, Mr. A. B. forine was at a loss to know how to vote, as the intimation of the Premier's resignation had put a funny omplexion on the whole proceedings.

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
