#### Sugar Regulations Clamped Down.

PRICE REMAINS THE SAME. the Food Control Board and Sugar Importers was held in the office of the Prime Minister, who presided. The ob-

Briefly it is this, the Food Control Board through "an error of judgment," has lost about \$120,-000 through the handling of sugar and this can only be made up in an extra tax or importing 2500 barrels or more at the present market price of 6% in New York, and selling it at 25 cents. In discussing the situation the Prime Minister admitted that general imports this year would be in the neighborhood of seven million dollars whom he found there. They were short of last year which means a big shortage in the revenue from this source. At the present time the Food Control Board have 2000 barrels of sugar in the city and 4000 barrels not yet arrived, but all purchased at the high price. After a discussion of the matter it was unanimously decided that the best course was for the Food Control Board to continue its work.
