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Founder of Bahaim Dead.

BROTHERHOOD OF MAN THE PURPOSE.

JERUSALEM.—(Associated Press.)—The death of Hadda, Palestine, recently of Abdul Baha Abbas, founder of the Bahai movement, removes from the Orient a great personality, who has long been regarded as a prophet by thousands of followers scattered throughout the Occident as well as in the Near East. With his death, the movement has passed under the guidance of a committee of 19 representing different religions and races. Abdul Baha (servant of God) was 77 years old and his career had been a romantic one. He was exponent of an universal movement whose aim was the realization of the brotherhood of man, and it had gained adherents in Europe, Asia, and America and in some of these continents huge temples had been erected for the observance of his teachings. His funeral assumed an international aspect at which were present many notables representing many countries. Sir Herbert Samuel, High Commissioner of Palestine, was in the procession.

Had Strong Radical Tendencies.

At the age of 20, Abdul Baha and his father, Baha O'llah, were sent to the penal colony of Acca in Syria because of their radical teachings. For more than 40 years he suffered the vicissitudes of a political prisoner. He was liberated in 1908 at the earnest solicitation of his followers in all parts of the world. Soon after his release, he started on a long journey which took him to Europe and America and resulted in the swift spreading of his message and gospel. While in the United States in 1912, he spoke from many Christian pulpits and before many different organizations, schools and colleges. In 1920, he was knighted by Great Britain for his humanitarian work in Syria and for his service for world peace. Bahaim is a social reform. It aims at the freeing of mankind from the religious, social and political yokes of the times. Among the things for which it stands are: An universal religion, universal language, a parliament of international disputes, universal education, a perfect civilization founded on simplicity and co-operation and emphasis on the things of life.

Happiness of Nations.

This world movement found adherents of almost every religion—Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, Zoroastrianism, Confucianism, Judaism and Christianity. Almost every race and country of the globe contributes adherents to the organization for international brotherhood. People came to the city of Acca from all parts of the world to see and talk with Abdul Baha Abbas. His home was a regular Babel. Within it gathered peoples of all races and creeds. The creed of Bahaim is found in this statement by Baha O'llah, its founder: "We desire but the good of the world and the happiness of the nations; yet they deem us a stirrer up of strife and sedition worthy of bondage and banishment. . . . that all nations should become one in faith, and all men as brothers; that the bonds of affection and unity between the sons of men should be strengthened; that diversity of religion should cease, and differences of race be annulled. . . . What harm is there in this? Yet so it shall be; these fruitless strifes, these ruinous wars shall pass away, and the 'Most Great Peace' shall come. . . . Is not this that which Christ foretold? . . . Yet do we see your kings and rulers lavishing their treasures more freely on means for the destruction of the human race than on that which would conduce to the happiness of mankind. These strifes and this bloodshed and discord must cease, and all men be as one kindred and one family. . . . Yet not a man glory in this, that he loves his country; let him rather glory in this, that he loves his kind."

Egyptian Coldbloodedness.

STARTED RIOTS AND BIAMED GREEKS.

London. (Associated Press)—Factional hatred of Europeans by Egyptians is one of the causes assigned by a military court for the rioting in Alexandria in May last, which resulted in 79 deaths. The court has found, after an investigation, that the outbreak was provoked by adherents of Said Zaglouli Pasha, Nationalist leader, who are said by the court to have been determined to reap political advantage by forcing the government to shed the blood of Egyptians. "The Egyptian view of the case is that the riots were caused by Greeks firing of peaceful demonstrations," the court states in conclusion. The demonstrations were not peaceful, and there is no evidence that the Greeks started the trouble by firing.

Hatred of Europeans.

"There is no doubt, moreover, that the mobs had a very definite organization. The court has found no evidence as to what this organization was or by whom it was directed. The court draws attention to a very important fact. Always there has existed in Egypt, at any rate among the lower classes, a fanatical hatred of Europeans. It has shown itself again and again. "This outbreak in Alex-

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
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andria happened because the people thought the hand of the government was relaxing and that the authorities dare not act against them. They took two days for preparation and then the long pent hatred of Europeans burst out. If this is not the correct view it is difficult to understand why the police should have joined in, or why the soldiers of the Third Battalion Egyptian Army, who had arrived from Cairo only the day before, should have forgotten their discipline and used

their arms to shoot down Europeans in the streets. "Given similar circumstances, this feeling will always manifest itself in the future, as it has done in the past, and a very long period of time must elapse before this feeling can be eradicated." The Italian, French and Greek consuls gave evidence. They solemnly protested, states the report, against the treatment of their nationals, and stated that they could never consent to their being protected by a force composed exclusively of Egyptians.

Berlin. (Associated Press)—The propaganda of a man who claims to be an "apostle of Mormonism" and who has been operating in Prussia and East Prussia promises "young girls, who will go to Utah" large rewards, introduction into the "holiness of the Temple," and much happiness, according to newspaper reports. The newspapers have warned German girls against the man as an "imposter."

Plug Came Out of Coconut.
