MAKES SANDSTONE INTO GRANITE

Tests made at the Bureau of Standards show that by simply soaking sandstone in melted sulphur and then allowing the stone to cool the crushing strength of the stone is increased from 200 to 300 per cent., making it in this respect equal to granite. Sandstone is porous, and if im-mersed for a sufficient length of time n the molten sulphur the latter soak all through it and hardens there at the stone is cooled.
