Throughout Monday the owners' egal representatives attempted to oard the vessel, but the man in charge refused to parley with them. Just before midnight Mme. de Casares, the managing director of the wner company, accompanied by her legal advisers and by river police, made a final effort to get on board and, according to an eye-witness, the party withdrew only when personal violence was feared.

A member of the crew of the colier Stanton, which was moored longside the General Serret during he night and from which the boarding attempt was made, told the folowing story of the adventure:-
