VOTE ON THE IRISH CHURCH.

They had a very sharp debate in the British House of Commons on Tuesday night, on the bill for the disestablishment of the Irish Church. After Mr. Walpole and the O'Donoghue had spoken—the latter making a fervid speech in favor of the bill—that austere Conservative, Gathorne Hardy, resolutely opposed the measure. He said that Mr. Gladstone had pledged himself and his followers to the destruction of all that was deemed most sacred, and maintained that the Church had always fulfilled its mission. Mr. Gladstone then rose to conclude the debate, reviewing the arguments which had been made for and against the bill, and declaring that a new policy for Ireland, of which this was the first step, was necessary. The speaker resumed his seat amid deafening cheers, and the House divided on the motion that the bill be read a second time, with the following result:—For the motion, 368; against 250—majority for the Government being 118. The announcement of the result was loudly cheered in the House. The cheers were taken up by the people in the lobbies, and the news was thus conveyed to an immense crowd outside the House, who joined in the applause with the wildest enthusiasm. Parliament adjourned immediately afterwards for the Easter holidays, and will not resume business till the first of April.

Letter from a Dead Man!

THE MACLEAN MURDER STORY EXPLODED—DAILY ALIVE AND WELL—HIS EMPHATIC DENIAL ABOUT THE ALLEGED MURDER.

We have to thank Dr. Keating for the perusal of a letter which he has received from James Daly, formerly of Morriston, whose death and death-bed confession of having murdered the late Rev. Alex. McLean of Puslinch, was some weeks ago so minutely described in a sensation report in the *Wentworth (Dundas) News*, and which naturally caused considerable excitement in Puslinch, in Guelph, and wherever Mr. McLean was known. We stated our mistrust in the story at the time we published it, and Dr. Keating's letter, which was subsequently given in the *Mercury*, set the mind of every reasonable man at rest with regard to its untruthfulness. Daly's own letter now furnishes conclusive evidence that the whole story from beginning to end was a malicious fabrication.

Daly's letter is dated Connersville, Indiana, March 14th. He says that on the night Mr. McLean received his injury (24th May, 1864) he was in company with a very respectable young lady and her brother in Hamilton—Mr. John Smith and sister. He was in their company all the afternoon and evening of that day, until 11 o'clock at night, after which in company with half a dozen young men he went to Dundas, where he stopped till the following day at his mother's. He says he cannot understand what object any one could have now in fabricating such a story about his murdering Mr. McLean, as he lived long enough in Morriston after Mr. McLean's death for any one to have accused him of the deed if they desired to do so.

He then refers to Dr. Keating's letter, which cleared him of any such imputation, and heartily thanks him for his friendly and disinterested defence of an absent man, who was unjustly charged with such an awful crime, and closes his letter by stating that he intends in the fall to go to California to his brother.

VERY SHARP.—The *Elora Observer* of last week, in copying our remarks about the "penny wise and pound foolish" practice of encouraging underbidding among teachers, says—"Might not these remarks apply with equal force to the system of underbidding pursued by newspaper publishers, at which the publishers of that journal appear to be very successful." We commend the "high" morality which our meddling neighbor is preaching, but which he never practices. He is extremely sharp, but on this occasion he omitted to give one of the strongest illustrations in point, when he forgot to tell his readers that his underbidding this year for the Township of Maryboro' printing for the year amounted to the magnificent sum of \$4 all told, for which our high moral friend does the Council's whole printing and advertising for the year. So much for the *Observer's* impudent lecture, and the way he acts up to his preaching.

MILITIA APPOINTMENTS.—Great complaints are made in Montreal and elsewhere at the manner in which the Militia appointments are being made. When military schools were introduced by the Macdonald-Dorion Government, it was understood that they were intended to qualify persons to become officers, and that, where the militia was organized, none but those who passed the schools and obtained certificates would receive appointments. It appears, however, that men possessing no knowledge of drill are being appointed, merely because they formerly held commissions in the sedentary militia, while the claims of cadets holding certificates are passed over.

NEWTON AS A VELOCIPEDIST.—Dryasius has discovered that Sir Isaac Newton, while yet a lad, "made a small cart with four wheels, in which he could drive himself by turning a windlass." He wants to know if this machine in construction is different from the handcar at present used by workmen on railways? and if anything is known of the machinery of Sir Isaac's "small cart?" and if so, whether it might not be applied to the improvement of velocipedes?

A saloon keeper in Houston, Texas, has a close carriage stationed in front of his place, in which he stows inebriates who are too feeble to get home. TOWN COUNCIL.

A special Meeting of the Town Council was held last (Tuesday) night. All the members present except Messrs. Hefferman and Mitchell.

A letter was read from Mr. Wm. Reynolds regarding errors in the assessment of lots 15 and 16, Surrey street, advertised for sale for arrears. The report of the special Committee was read by Mr. Chadwick, recommending that Mr. Hough's resignation as Town Clerk be accepted, but that the offices of Clerk and Treasurer be not separated. Council went into Committee on the whole, and after some discussion, Mr. Hough verbally tendered his resignation as Treasurer. Committee rose, and applications for the vacant office were read from Messrs. R. Meredith and E. Newton, but were ruled out of order and laid upon the table. Mr. Hough's resignation was then read and accepted; after which it was moved by Mr. Chadwick, seconded by Mr. McCurry, that the report of the special Committee be adopted, which was carried. An amendment moved by Mr. Howard, seconded by Mr. Goldie, that the report of the special Committee be amended by recommending a separation of the offices of Clerk and Treasurer was lost—only four voting for it.

The Clerk was instructed to advertise for applications for the vacant offices, and Council adjourned.
