

...man claimed to be learned in the law, but in politics he was a nonentity. Laughing and sneering, he was now giving his last kick and the next morning would be his political funeral. He then briefly referred to some of the political questions of the day, and corroborated what Mr. Clarke had said with regard to the distribution of the surplus. He assured them that the County of Wellington would have justice done to her in this matter, and that she would receive a fair share of the surplus. (Cheers.)

Mr. Hunt made a few remarks in favour of Mr. Drew. All the candidates except Messrs. Higginbotham and Drew then retired in favour of those two. Mr. Drew most unfavourably rushed forward and commenced a reply to the speeches against him, but he was stopped by the Returning Officer. He then demanded a poll, which was fixed for Friday next. After three cheers for the Queen, the Returning Officer and the candidates the crowd quietly dispersed.

South Riding of Wellington.

Mr. Sheriff Grange, Returning Officer for the South Riding of Wellington, received the writ to-day (Monday), and has appointed Tuesday the 20th, for the nomination day at Guelph.

North Lanark.

"William the Forlorn" has been handsomely whipped in North Lanark. Mr. Galbraith has been elected by the handsome majority of 292 votes over his Ministerial opponent Wm. McDougall. Mr. Rosamond, the other candidate, though a Conservative by education and family ties, is the pronounced opponent of the Administration, and publicly and privately pledged himself to support Opposition. If we join his vote to that of Mr. Galbraith, we have a majority of nearly three to one against the Government in a county which at last election returned Mr. McDougall, then one of its members by acclamation! This victory is all the more significant from the fact that McDougall, who a year ago, was strongly opposed to the Government has for some time been making one of his characteristic somersaults and lately has been an out and out supporter of John A. Macdonald. This practical politician, this unstable statesman, this personification of all that is treacherous and unreliable in a politician has been taught a timely lesson, which may be of some profit to him. William the unsteady and unreliable has been defeated in the same constituency which at the previous election returned him by acclamation. He has been sent about his business, and can now look to Washington or go to Wellington, whichever way he likes. May such be the fate of all political traitors like Wm. McDougall.

ELECTION NEWS.

The contest in Essex promises an Opposition gain. Mr. O'Connor's unfitness for a Cabinet office is so thoroughly felt by intelligent men of all parties that his defeat seems only a question of a few days. Mr. Arthur Rankin has entered the field late, but after the pressing solicitations of some of the most influential men in the community, and they are now working for him with energy and zeal.

In East Elgin the Reformers are working heartily for Mr. Harvey, and have every prospect of beating Mr. Price by a large majority. In West Elgin the Reformers are also working vigorously.

A reaction has set in among the working men of Toronto, who begin to see that the Government merely want to get their votes, and care nothing for their interests.

Mr. Cameron continues to meet with the most flattering success in his progress through the South Riding of Huron.

Mr. Scriver has been elected for Huntingdon by acclamation.

Three Ontario members were elected on Saturday. Mr. Hagar was returned (by acclamation) for Prescott; Mr. Galbraith for North Lanark; and Mr. Mackenzie Bowell for North Hastings.

Livingstone's Letters to the Foreign Office.

Earl Granville has addressed a letter to Mr. Stanley, acknowledging the receipts at the Foreign Office of despatches, brought by that gentleman from Dr. Livingstone. Earl Granville also takes occasion to congratulate Mr. Stanley upon the courage he displayed in carrying out his undertaking. Lieut. Dawson, the chief of the English search expedition which sailed from this country in the steamer *Abdus*, before Mr. Stanley's first despatch announcing his meeting with Dr. Livingstone was received, left Zanzibar for England on the 21st May. He is expected to arrive in London about the middle of next month.

New York, August 2.—The *Herald* has published letters from London received by Mr. Stanley from Viscount Enfield, Earl Granville, and a son of Dr. Livingstone, Lord Enfield, in the name of Earl Granville, acknowledges the receipt of letters and documents from Dr. Livingstone, delivered by Mr. Stanley to Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris for transmission to the Foreign Department. Earl Granville says in his letter that he has no doubt of the genuineness of the letters purporting to come from Livingstone. Livingstone's son says he has no doubt that the papers and letters brought to him by Mr. Stanley are from his father. The *Herald's* London despatch says Mr. Stanley is invited to dine with Lord Granville and Lady Franklin and other distinguished people.

Brown, the champion oarsman, has been presented with a \$200 gold watch and chain by the young men of Halifax.


