CHICAGO, Dec. 11th.—The Tribune's Sioux city special says Little Buckshot, a half breed secut, who was with Ger. Custer's Eluckshills expedition last summer came to Boise city, Dakota a few days since, and reported having seen in the Blackhills country recently a party of white men prospecting in the vicinity of Lower hills. They had their camp well fortified and stocked with animals and wagons, and could, he said, defend themselves against large odds.
