Moved by I. Rathburn, seconded by S. J. Walker, that Wm. H. Simpson be recommended to the Judge of the County of Middlesex as constable. Carried.

The Council adjourned to meet at the call of the Reeve.

# SPRING ASSIZES.—Before His Lordship Justice Patterson.

The Queen vs. Nathan and Phoebe Cooper, of the Township of Westminster, who were charged with administering some noxious substances to a niece of his named Mary Service, on the 23rd of January last, and also with procuring the services of a "doctor" on the 28th of the same month, and at his command using an instrument upon the person of the girl Service.

The case lasted all day, and nearly a dozen witnesses were examined, testifying to the various good character of prisoners. After being addressed by counsel, his Lordship summed up pretty favorably to prisoners, ably laying down the various points, pro and con. The jury retired at 6:45 p. m., and after an absence of nearly an hour and a-half, returned to Court with a verdict of "Not Guilty." The prisoners were accordingly discharged.

In the case of Gapp vs. Plaintiff a verdict was rendered for defendant, with leave reserved to move as to the costs. The case, it will be recollected, was to recover damages for an alleged illegal seizure by the Sheriff of Lambton.

The Grand Jury brought in the following: Queen vs. Samuel White, larceny. No bill.  
Queen vs. McBroome, larceny—True bill on two indictments.

The case of the Queen vs. McBroome was taken up, the accused being charged with taking goods as clerk and neglecting to charge the same. After the evidence was given, the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty." M. C. Cameron, Q. C., for Crown; E. Meredith for prisoner.

**MORRISON vs. JOHNSON.**  
An action on a covenant contained in a chattel mortgage which the defendant had given the plaintiff for eight hundred dollars, payable in instalments of \$100 each. The action was brought to recover the second instalment of \$100. Verdict for plaintiff \$103, and certificate for costs.

**THE GRAND JURY** charged with having counterfeiting moulds in his possession, withdrew his previous plea of "not guilty," and pleaded "guilty."
