COURT OF REVISION.

Number One Committee Hear Assess-
ment Appeals—They Will Finish
Business at Another Meeting.

Number One Committee met last night in
the Council Chamber at a court of revision
and to hear complaints in re assessments.

There were present Aid. Moule (chairman),
Anderson and Taylor, Secretary Abbott
and Assessor Grant. Following are those
who appealed and their grievances:

Arthur Lewis was assessed for dog but
denies owning one.

Elizabeth Gibson said she was owner of
property. Her son wanted to be assessed
and save statute labor tax.

The agents of the following firms appeared
against being assessed on property stored in
warehouses: W. C. McDonald, Halifax
Sugar Company, Geo. Watt, Lucas Parke,
McIntosh, Glass & Co., Massey Manufac-

turing Company, St. Lawrence Sugar Re-

fining Company.

The following appealed against the in-

come tax on the ground that their incomes
did not exceed \$700 per year: John J.

Robb, H. Ornduff, James Lamb and John
O'Gorman.

The Great Northern Railroad Company
appealed against assessment on the ground
of having no office in the city.

Geo. C. Joly claimed that his stock did
not exceed \$2,000 in value.

H. C. Smyth, of 394 Waterloo street, said
he was a tenant and wished to be assessed
as such. Granted.

Abraham Fox declared his personal prop-

erty did not exceed \$100.

F. Robertson, agent for the Federation
Life, claimed that the company's whole
property was assessed in Toronto.

James A. O'Neill stated he was assessed
having no claim in the city.

Ralph Ferguson protested against paying
the statute labor tax as he was a member of
the Seventh Division.

Henry Dawson—I have no dog; he has
been killed.

Owen Coleman claimed he was a tenant
of 517 Bathurst street (and wished to be
assessed as such).

Wm. Hocken swore he had no dog; and
no personal property.

Michael O'Hearn stated that his personal
property did not exceed \$25.

Wm. Morse also claimed to have none. Jas.
Fox swore that his personal property did
not exceed \$200 in value although assessed
at \$400.

John Mortimer—I bought property some
time ago for \$1,500 and have made im-

provements on it since.

Mr. J. C. Judd appeared on behalf of the
New York and North American Insurance
Companies and submitted that the branches
could not be assessed as the assessment
should be taken at New York according to
Chancellor Boyd's decision.

S. Swartz appealed against the personal
property tax, claiming his own property
did not exceed \$110 in value.

Wm. Croxley has a collection of which
two are assessed for \$1,400 each, and the
other for \$1,600. He appeals against the
assessment and avers his readiness to sell
two at \$300 and the other at \$350.

The committee will not render their de-

cision until later. They adjourned to meet
again at 7:30 Monday evening and expect
to finish their business on that occasion.

A TERRIBLE ORDEAL.

Chin-Ped in Mud for Eighteen Hours—
The Victim Loses his Reason.

ALBION, Ont., July 11.—Aron
Tys, a resident of this city, has had a
thrilling experience that will probably re-

sult in his death. He was found firmly im-

bedded on the bank of Little Timber Creek
in the blue clay and mud, with the water
within two inches of his chin. He had
