The Late Mrs. Wm. Clark.
The following obituary notice of the late
Mrs. Wm. Clark, 355 Central avenue, is
published in the Canada Presbyterian:

Mrs. Clark—Catharine McKay, relict of the
late Wm. Clark, died on Sunday, Nov. 17,
at her residence, 355 Central avenue, of
Wm. Clark was a household word in many
families connected with the Presbyterian
Church, especially in Western Ontario. Mr.
Clark was closely connected with the begin-
nings, progress and triumphs of the Presby-
terianism, especially in the London Presby-
tery, which in his early days covered an area of 200
miles by 10. A very great number of his
gregarious west of Hamilton to-day have a
grateful remembrance of Mr. Clark's interest
in their prosperity and growth. Mrs. Clark
was born in Berwick, in the south of
Scotland, on June 7, 1837. She married Mr.
Clark at Inverness in April, 1853, and immedi-
ately afterwards emigrated to Canada, and
after staying a few months in Montreal and
also in Toronto came to London in 1854, when
she consisted of only a few houses. From the
very commencement of Mr. Clark's residence
in London his house became a centre of re-
ligious influence, a place of rendezvous of the
faithful, of rest, shelter and entertainment to
the pioneer missionaries of the Presbyterian
Church and a center of missionary operations,
gradually increasing and spreading throughout
the surrounding country.

In connection with those early pioneer move-
ments, Mrs. Clark became a prominent per-
son, entering most heartily and with sympathy
into the work of the mission, and in the
necessities of those servants of Christ and
in enjoying their fellowship and the benefit of
their Christian converse and instruction. Mrs.
Clark combined to some extent at least,
the character of both Mary and Martha.
Often in later days did she refer to those early
associations with regard and depth of feeling
indicative of her sympathy with the cause of
the Lord, and the moulding which her spiritual
nature had received from those halcyon days
of association.

Mrs. Clark was naturally modest,
of a retiring and mild disposition, warm
and steadfast in her attachments, and especially
sympathetic. Her nature shrank from
ostentation and display, and she was not
acts of kindness were a carrying out of the
precept, "Let not thy left hand know what
thy right hand doeth." As a member of the
church she took special interest in the pros-
perity of her congregation, and in the
general. An evidence of this she has
left by her will a handsome legacy to the
Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church.

2, from her late residence, 355 Central avenue,
at St. Andrew's Church Cemetery, the pall-

from the present and rising generations, who
