Windsor.Was Going to Detroit to Work, and Was
Thought to Be Beating His Way.Word was received in the city this
afternoon of the death of a London
young man on the Grand Trunk near
Windsor early on Wednesday morn-
ing. The unfortunate was James
Mansell, whose mother lives at 331 Hill
street. Mansell was about 21 years of
age, and was a retainer by occupation.
He formerly worked at McCleary's, but
secured work in Detroit a year or so
ago. He was laid off during the winter
months, and had been waiting for better
times. Yesterday he got a letter from
his former employer at Detroit telling
him to come on again, and last night
he left home for that place. It is
thought that he was riding on a freight
and that he fell off and was killed.
At any rate, his body was found at
daylight this morning at Faced, a
mile east of Windsor. A Windsor
corner took charge of the remains,
and an inquest is being held this after-
noon.Deceased was a son of Anthony Man-
selli, who is serving seven years at
Kingston on a charge of manslaughter.
He had a difficulty with a man named
Platt at Labatt's brewery, where the
two worked, and Platt was thrown
off a down a flight of stairs and was
killed.The mother of the dead boy was near-
ly frantic shortly after receiving the
news of his death. She was in a
very nervous condition and a bevy of
neighbors were trying to comfort her
as much as possible. There are sev-
eral other children. The body is ex-
