Sewer to be Brick.

More Substantial Affair Than Tiles.

The Board of Works' Recommendation Adopted-Alterations in the Specifications.

A special meeting of the City Council was held last night to discuss sewer matters. Most of the members gathered in the ante-room, off the chamber, to await the action of No. 2 committee, who had assembled to consider the matter, and report to the council. The committee started about 7:30, but the discussion that ensued over the building of a shed on the works and the grinding of shovels, etc., kept the committee engaged until about 9 o'clock. Then the mayor rose to explain the cause of the meeting-the consideration of substituting brick for tile in section F of the new sewerage system, and one or two amendments to the specifications. The report of No. 2 was as follows: Clause 1 recommended that section F, extending from Ridout and York to Gray and Richmond streets, a distance of 3.100 feet, be constructed of brick, two rings of egg-shaped form, and of dimensions 1 foot 8 inches by 2 feet 6 inches, instead of 24-inch tile, as directed by the council of 1896; the change to be made, providing Consulting Engineer Compman agrees

Ald. Parnell read a letter from Enwhich they expressed the opinion that a better sewer could be built of brick, and that an egg-shaped sewer, when running full, would carry more than a circular one of 24 inches. It also had a greater velocity with the same volume of flow when the depth did not exceed eight inches or one foot, and that for a great number of years the flow would be small.

The engineer in that communication says: "In comparing the cost of the two sewers I have allowed for three inches of concrete over the pipe and four inches on each side, similar to the Wharncliffe road sewer. "The cost of each class of sewer (exclusive of excavation) would probably

be about \$1 80 per lineal foot.
"The 24-inch tile not being so much in demand as the smaller size, may possibly make the cost of these the greater than I supposed. In any case believe the brick sewer will be found to be the most durable, and it would have the advantage also of employing more city labor and material." Another letter was read as follows:

"The work includes the construction of 500 feet of 3 feet circular brick sewer 511 feet, of 2-foot and 3-foot egg-shaped brick sewer, and 2,911 feet of 1-foot 8-inch by 2-foot 6-inch egg "The average depth is 17 feet 6 inches and the estimated cost is \$16,-000, or about \$4 07 per lineal foot.

Bathurst and Talbot street sewers will be taken up where met with, and throughout the entire length arrangement is made to provide direct con-nection of private drains with the new "Richmond street sewer shall be connected in a sub-chamber at Horton
