In the Dining-Room.

THURSDAY, AUG. 5.
BREAKFAST—Mutton (iced, salt), codfish in piece of potatoes, Toast, French pancakes, Coffee.
LUNCHEON—Cornish pasties, Sliced tomatoes, Thin-sliced bread, Iced tea or raspberry shrub, Blackberry bread.
DINNER—Bouillon, Chicken pudding, Mashed potatoes, Cauliflower, Custard pudding.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

French Pancakes—Three eggs, yolks and whites beaten separately, one cup milk, one-quarter teaspoon salt, one teaspoon sugar, one-half cup flour, one-half tablespoonful salad oil. Add the milk, salt and sugar to the yolks. Pour one-third of this mixture into the flour and stir to a smooth paste; add the remainder of the milk and beat well, then add the oil. Heat and butter a small frying pan, and pour into it enough of the mixture to cover the bottom. When lightly browned, turn and brown the other side. Spread each with jelly, roll up, and dust with powdered sugar.

Cornish Pasties—One-half pound lean beef (fresh or left from roast), two potatoes, one apple, one onion, one heaping tablespoonful salt, one-half teaspoonful pepper, two tablespoonsful cold water. Cut meat, potatoes and apple into small dice, pepper, salt and water to the meat, potatoes and apple. Sift together two cups of flour, one-half teaspoon shortening (good lard or lard and butter in equal parts), stir in enough cold water to make a stiff dough. Roll out one-quarter inch thick, cut into rounds six inches across, place on each round some of the meat mixture, brush the edges with a little beaten egg or milk, pinch edges together and bring them to the top of the round. Season only with salt, and bake in a moderate oven 20 minutes.

Raspberry Shrub—Four quarts of red raspberries to one quart best cider vinegar; let stand four days; then strain. To each pint of juice add one pound of granulated sugar, boil twenty minutes, bottle, and keep in a dry, cool place. To serve, fill as much as desired in a glass, add crushed ice and water. Very refreshing and wholesome in hot weather.

Bouillon—Six pounds of beef and bones, cut up meat and break the bones, add two quarts of cold water and simmer slowly five hours. Strain through a fine sieve, removing every particle of fat. Season only with salt, add a teaspoonful, and one-half saltspoonful pepper. Sufficient for two days.

Blackberry Bread—Stew blackberries or any other small fruit and sweetener to taste (about one-half cup of sugar to over a quart of berries), and pour hot over thin slices of baked bread, buttered, and with crust cut off, bread, alternate layers of fruit and bread, and leaving a thick layer of fruit for the last. Put a plate on top, and when cool set on ice. Serve with sweetened cream. Inexpensive, but delicious.

Chicken Pudding—Dress and cut one chicken into small pieces, put it in a kettle, with water just sufficient to cover, let simmer one-half hour, add a teaspoonful salt, and one-eighth teaspoonful pepper; let simmer until tender, then take out the chicken and put into a three-quart baking dish. Have ready one quart cream, corn grated to which add three eggs beaten light and one pint sweet milk, one-half teaspoonful salt and one-eighth saltspoonful pepper, and pour this

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Board of Education

Accept Several Resignations From Teachers.

Two Real Estate Deals Proposed—The Robb Medal.

The board of education held their regular meeting last night, with Chairman Greenlee, Trustees Stephenson, Gillean, Strong, Teasdale, McCormick, Evans, Martyn, Burdick, Johnston, Logan, Campbell, Dr. English, J. Macpherson and Secretary McElhennan present.

Several teachers tendered resignations. They were from Miss Hattie D. Irwin, of the fourth department Aberdeen school; Miss E. Williams, Aberdeen school; Miss Maud Riggsby, St. George's school; Miss Mary E. Brock, Aberdeen school, and Mr. J. F. Mesmer, of the Collegiate Institute staff. The latter announced his intention of quitting educational work. All the resignations were accepted.

The secretary, on receiving Mr. Mesmer's resignation, telegraphed Mr. Mesmer regarding it, and received an answer advising that an effort be made to secure the services of Mr. D. E. Galbraith, Mr. Mesmer's predecessor. Referred to No. 1 committee with power.

Miss May E. Shopland, teacher of the Queen's avenue kindergarten, is visiting in British Columbia, asked an extension of her vacation to Sept. 15. Granted.

Miss A. Powell notified the board of her readiness to resume her duties as primary teacher at the Wortley road school. Filed.

Principal R. M. Graham, of the Simcoe street school, wrote recommending that the assistant teachers, during the model school term, appointed last year be reappointed. This was decided upon by the board.

Mr. F. Fryer applied for the position of assistant teacher at the Simcoe street school, and he was appointed at the usual salary, \$250, for the model school term.

Miss Lulu McConnell, applied for a position on kindergarten staff, and the application was referred to No. 1 committee.

Mr. A. Hosson, of the Collegiate Institute, wrote stating that his name had been dropped a grade, and applied to have his name restored to its original grade. Referred to No. 1 committee.

The report of No. 1 committee, asking that they be empowered to get the annual supply of pens, ink and paper, was adopted.

A clause in the report of No. 2 committee recommended the disposal of a lot adjoining the Aged People's Home, Richmond street north. The lot was purchased at five or six years ago with a view to erecting a school thereon. The committee considered that it would never be required, as it is an undesirable situation. Dr. Campbell seconded the motion to adopt the clause. The property had cost \$700, and was not desirable for a school site.

Trustee Logan moved in amendment, that the clause be struck out. He was on the committee who purchased the land, and believed it would some day be required.

The amendment was carried on a division of 7 to 6 all the members voting, and then, as is the usual custom at the board, the original motion was put. Here a amusing difficulty arose. Dr. Teasdale did not care to vote, and there was a deadlock, which the chairman had to break by voting against the motion.

Dr. Teasdale then moved that No. 2 committee place the lot at the north end of the city on the market, and any offers for the property be submitted to the board. Carried.

Another clause in the report of the committee asking power to purchase a lot on the northwest corner of Grey and Waterloo streets on which to erect a school was adopted.

Trustee Logan referred to the high standing of the Collegiate Institute of London, and moved that the board place on record its appreciation of the very efficient work done by the teaching staff.

Dr. Campbell's motion to reconsider the appointment of Miss McMorley to the teaching staff was pressed. Trustee Logan seconded, giving as his reason that Miss McMorley was an outsider. The motion was lost.

The special committee consisting of the chairman of the board, the chairmen of the committees, and Trustees Logan and Campbell, and Mr. Macpherson appointed to interview the mayor regarding the Robb bequest, reported through Chairman Greenlee that an acquaintance had been given for the money by the chairman of the board, Mr. J. A. Jackson, of Fingal, and Mr. Campbell, both of whom were drawing 6 per cent in the city treasury, and gave a better investment offered it could be taken advantage of. The income was at the disposal of the Trustee Logan. On motion of Trustee Gillean the report was adopted, and it was left with No. 2 committee to have the medal prepared.

At the suggestion of Trustee Burdick No. 2 committee were authorized to appoint an inspector to see that the condition of the city schools is done at the proper time.
