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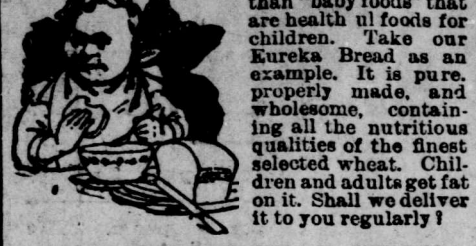

ARTILLERY LEAVE TODAY

Orders for the Departure Came Last Night.

Will March From the Barracks to the Station.

Entrain on the C. P. R. at 5:10 O'Clock.

Addresses Will Be Delivered Before They Start—Names and Addresses of Those Who Leave Today.

The artillerymen leave London for Ottawa this afternoon, at 6:10 o'clock, on the C. P. R. Major Fairbank received orders to this effect late last night. They will go on parade at the barracks, and with the men who are at the school, as an escort, and the Seventh Band they will march directly to the C. P. R. station. All addresses will be delivered there. An enthusiastic send-off is assured.

Obituary.

MR. ALEXANDER WRIGHT. Mr. Alexander Wright, father of Mr. Samuel Wright, of this city, died at his residence in Galt on New Year's evening, rather unexpectedly, although he had been unwell for a long time before. Mr. Wright, who was 84 years of age, was one of Galt's best-known citizens. He was a native of Scotland and had been a resident of that town for between 40 and 50 years. He worked in Crombie & Co.'s foundry, and afterwards for many years for Goldie & McCullough, but had lived retired during the last two months of his life. He was a faithful member of Knox Church, and was respected by all who knew him. He leaves a widow, three sons and three daughters—Samuel, of the city; Thomas W., professor of mathematics in Union College, Schenectady, N. Y.; Mrs. Andrew Clark, Galt; Mrs. McWilliams, North Dumfries, and Miss Wright, at home.

MR. RICHARD S. GENGE. Another correspondent writes: Another of Dundas' pioneers passed away to the great beyond on Tuesday night in the person of Richard S. Genge. The deceased was a resident of Dundas for upwards of 45 years, and died in his 77th year. For about two months prior to his death he was in ill-health, and gradually weakened till the end. He was a good undertaker, and one of the best cabinet-makers who ever settled in the western part. The sympathy of the community is with the relatives in their bereavement.

CORPORAL LENOX DISAPPEARS Defaulter Ayling's Successor at the Barracks Not at His Post—Oath-Takers Funds Again Missing.

A few weeks ago Lance-Corporal Ayling, steward of the canteen at Walseley Barracks, disappeared from the district with a sum of money belonging to the men.
