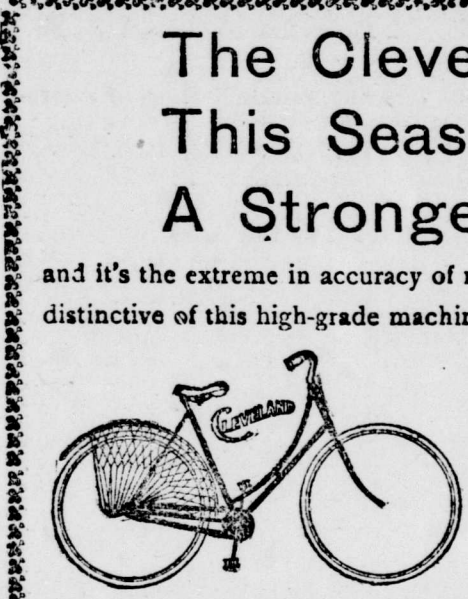
**SEAFORTH VS. EXETER.**

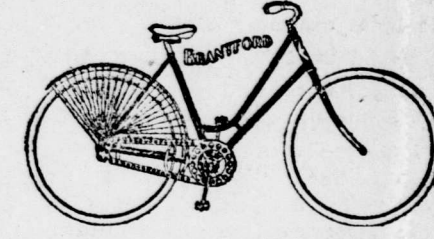
