Rev. George Mason, of Baynam Baptist Church,

Falls Dead in the Groom's Arms While Conducting a Wedding.

St. Thomas, Ont., April 4 .- Rev. George Mason, pastor of the Bayham and Malahide Baptist Church, dropped dead while conducting the marriage service of Leon C. Dancey, a prosperous Malahide farmer, and Miss Phoebe Travis, of Guysboro, at the bride's home in Guysboro last night.

Deceased had been for 25 years on his pastorate, and the name of Elder Mason is a household word in every home in East Elgin. Votes to Adjourn Until Next Tuesday.

The Premier's Manitoulin and North Shore Railway Bill Read a Third Time.
