A SERIOUS CASE!

An Entire Family in London Township Prostrated With the Smallpox.

Arva, Ont., April 4.—A distressing sight was presented at the window when Dr. McNeill, medical health officer for London township called at David C. McRobert's house, on con. 16, this morning. Cecil McRoberts, with his face covered with the confluent variety of smallpox, came to the window and said he had chicken pox, and not to be afraid. The whole family of five are down with smallpox, and the oldest girl is in Clinton suffering with the same disease. The doctor called at the school and ascertained that the McRoberts children had been absent since the 19th of February. It appears that one of the boys while going with the hay presser contracted the disease, and since then one by one has been ill with what was supposed to be chicken pox. The health officer was all day vaccinating and quarantining neighbors and those who had been exposed. The young man who had recovered has been all over, even to Granton, to get shaved, so that it is difficult to say where it will end.

A BULLET FOR CZAR NICHOLAS

Attempt Made to Assassinate the Russian Emperor in His Study.

The Shot Fired by an Officer of the Guard—Death of a Well-Known Editor—Serious Illness of the French Premier.

SHOT AT THE CZAR.

London, April 4.—A special dispatch from Vienna, says a report is published there that an officer of the guards entered the czar's study yesterday and fired at him with a revolver. His majesty was not hit, the dispatch adds, and the officer committed suicide. The story is doubted.

FAMINE CAUSES MANY DEATHS.

London, April 4.—Famine and typhus are raging throughout the governments of Kherson and Bessabia and portions of the government of Kieff and Taurida. The mortality is 20 per cent of the entire population.

AN EDITOR DEAD.

London, April 4.—Douglas Gordon Macrae, editor of the Financial Times, died yesterday in Switzerland. He was born in 1861. Mr. Macrae began as a printer's apprentice. His first contributions were to Cricket, and then he wrote weekly letters from London to papers at the Cape. He then started printing works and bought "Youth," a paper now defunct. He established the Financial Times and Draper's Journal, and traveled in all parts of the world, except China and Japan, studying finances, customs, commerce and industries, especially mining.

GREEKS AND TURKS CLASH.

London, April 4.—The Morning Leader publishes the following dispatch from Vienna: At Smyrna, on the strength of rumors that the Jews had murdered a Greek lad for ritual purposes, 10,000 infuriated Greeks stormed the ghetto. The Turkish troops charged the mob with bayonets, one being killed and fourteen others wounded.

ILLNESS OF THE FRENCH PREMIER.

Paris, April 4.—M. Waldeck-Rousseau (the premier) passed a very bad night. His physicians today found phlegmon (inflammation with suppurative tendency), beneath the tongue, and decided that an immediate operation was necessary. This was accomplished under chloroform. At noon the patient had improved and was free from fever.

NOTES FROM THE FAR EAST.

Matter of Dismantling Chinese Forts Discussed.

BOERS USED BRITISH BULLETS

Their Cartridges Were Made in Birmingham.

Reward of \$500 for the Capture of Dewet—Peace Envoy Executed.

Washington, D. C., April 4.—Gen. Chaffee has cabled the war department from Pekin that the military commanders representing the foreign powers there are now considering the question of disposing of the Chinese forts, and establishing fortified posts at proper intervals along the route from Pekin to the sea. The war department is pushing its preparations for the complete evacuation of China by American forces, save only the legation guards, and it is now stated that everything will be in readiness to embark Gen. Chaffee's army at Taku for Manila on May 30.

300,000 RUSSIANS FOR MANCHURIA London, April 5.—By the end of May, says the Moscow correspondent of the Daily Graphic, the Russian army in Manchuria will number 300,000 men. It is understood that the Russian minister of war, Katourakpine, reckons upon the possibility of having to dispatch an army corps southward into Corea.

TRULY CHINESE.

London, April 4.—The Reuter Telegraph Company has received the following dispatch from Pekin, April 4: "China's rejection of the Manchurian convention appears to be of a rather temporizing nature, leaving the matter still open to future discussion."

EUROPEAN SOLDIERS QUARREL.

London, April 5.—The Daily Chronicle publishes the following dispatch from Berlin: "Count Von Waldersee has sent an urgent telegram to Emperor William imploring him to endeavor to hasten the negotiations for the withdrawal of the allied troops, on the ground that it is impossible to prevent quarrels between the soldiers of the different nationalities, which might at any moment lead to serious trouble."
