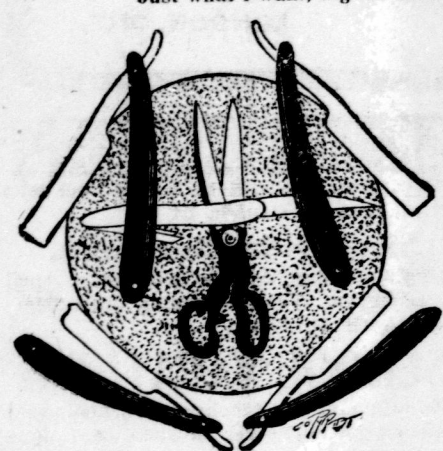

—On Good Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Sir John Stainer's beautiful lute cantata, which was given last week with great success, was repeated at the Dundas Street Methodist Church, will be repeated by the choir, assisted by Messrs. —GONE TO THE NORTHWEST. Among those who have gone to the Northwest, via the C. P. R., were Mr. and Mrs. Beattie and family, and Mr. Clark, of Westminster. The former will settle at Moosejaw, and the latter at Regina.

—DIPLOMA D'HONNEUR. The highest award at the International Exhibition of Culinary Products at Ghent, Belgium, Europe, has been awarded to the Canadian Packing Company, of London, Ontario, for their choice meats, beef and extracts.

—MISSION TO LEOPERS. A small but very interesting meeting was that held in the "Y" room in the interests of the Leper Mission. Rev. C. T. Scott gave a very able and inspiring Bible reading, on "God's call to his people." Mrs. Ellis sang very acceptably a sacred solo, and Mrs. Marr read interesting letters from Mr. and Mrs. Bailey. Donations amounting to \$9.50 were received per Miss Anderson, Mrs. Jones and Miss Auld.

—A banquet will be tendered the representatives of the International Old Boys, who meet here in executive next Saturday evening. This was decided upon at a largely attended meeting of the executive of the local Old Boys, which was held last night at the city hall. Police Magistrate Love and Messrs. E. J. MacRobert and J. R. Babcock were appointed a committee to make the necessary arrangements, and Secretary Bell will dispose of tickets to any citizens who wish to attend. There will be a number of delegates here next Saturday, and it is a desirable thing that the banquet should be a success.

—MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION. The monthly meeting of the Methodist Ministerial Association was held on Monday in Wesley Hall, Rev. George Jackson presided. Rev. G. J. Bishop was appointed visitor to Victoria Hospital for April and May. Arrangements were made to hold a union service in Dundas Center Church on the morning of Good Friday, the service to be taken by Messrs. Crossley and Hunter. Rev. William Quence gave a very able review of the first part of Dr. Dillingworth's Brampton lectures on "Personality, Human and Divine." Mr. Quence will complete the review at a subsequent meeting of the association. At the next meeting in May Rev. C. T. Scott will read a paper on "Archaeology."

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ACCEPTED WITH SORROW

Congregation of Memorial Church

Keenly Regret Rev. C. C. Owen's Departure.

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He gave his reasons for accepting the call to Vancouver. The work there, he felt, was calling for him and he thought he was obeying the voice of God by going. It was not until he had given the matter the most serious consideration and prayer that he had come to his decision. The congregation had worked so faithfully with him, so lovingly and so earnestly that it was indeed a great strain for him to part with them. He loved Memorial Church, and it would be hard for him to go, but he felt that it was the right thing to accept the call from Vancouver.

Mr. Cronyn, Mr. M. D. Fraser, Mr. P. E. Leonard and others expressed to a certain extent the feeling of the congregation. It was impossible for them to express fully the deep regret with

which this resignation was accepted. The sorrow with which they received the announcement was the burden of the words spoken by the various members, and indeed it must have been a trying moment for the rector of whom all the good things were being said, and said deservedly.

Mr. F. E. Betts moved and Mr. V. Cronyn seconded the following resolution:

That the congregation of the Memorial Church, having heard their pastor's explanation of the reasons which have prevailed on him to accept the call to Vancouver, and realizing that he feels to be a divine call which he is not at liberty to disobey, desire to express their conviction that viewing the matter as he does, no other course was open to him than the one adopted. And the congregation, while feeling the deepest regret at the loss they are about to sustain, desire it to be understood that their rector and Mrs. Owen bear with them to their new field of labor their sincerest good wishes for success in that field.

This was carried unanimously and the question of appointing a successor was broached. It was deemed advisable not to make any great haste, owing to the summer months coming on, but a committee was named to confer with the bishop in the matter, on motion of Messrs. M. D. Fraser and Thomas Orr. The committee will consist of the church wardens, Messrs. Andrew Ellis and James Granger; Messrs. V. Cronyn, F. E. Leonard, D. H. Howden, Dr. Shaw and Judge William Elliott.

—The discussion which followed brought about nothing satisfactory. The manufacturers thought that other divisions of the waterworks service might be touched upon. They did not like the idea of being singled out, although they knew that everything was being done for the city's interests.

It was pointed out to them by the board that with machines which registered by the trip much water was wasted. In the case of meters being put on, the cost would be increased considerably.

The petition was signed in behalf of the following firms: R. C. Struthers & Co., Hobbs Hardware Company, Charles Clark & Co., A. M. Smith & Co., McMahon & Granger, John Bowman Hardware and Coal Company, Hastings Hat and Cap Company, T. B. Escott & Co., Lind, Kerrigan & Co., John Marshall & Co., John McNeer & Sons, M. & M. E. Hook, Wood's Pair, E. Adams & Co., M. Masoret & Co.

In return for an account tendered by the street railway for damage done by the bursting of a water main on Dundas street, the solicitor will be instructed to put in an account of \$91 for the lowering of the main on Wortley road.

The proprietor of the Hodgins House applied for the remission of part of an account. Referred to the engineer.

The mayor occupied the chair in the absence of Mr. William Jones, and others present were Commissioner J. W. Jones, Secretary Ellwood and Engineer Moore.

—The idea of holding the meeting was to have the proposal emanate from a general meeting of the society, all former proposals having been made at committee meetings only. All agreed that it was very undesirable that the society should be much longer accommodated with a depository in such a place as it is now. The only question was whether the means could be secured for the erection of a new building. The time was deemed most opportune, as the centenary of the present society is approaching.

"This general meeting approves of the suggestion that a suitable lot be secured with or without a building, for a depository for the Western Ontario Bible Society in the City of London as soon as subscriptions and collections for the purpose of the purchasing the lot may be obtained."

Several sites were talked over, among them some stores already erected. The general impression seemed to be, and in this his lordship concurred, that it was desirable that a new building should be put up. This matter, however, as well as that of soliciting subscriptions was left for inquiry by the committee meeting on May 1st.

The executive, consisting of Bishop Baldwin, Rev. Dean Innes, Rev. James Kennedy, Mr. John Cameron and Mr. J. H. Adams and Messrs. Towns and Bowdrie, were permanent secretary, Rev. J. H. Orme.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again at the call of the president.

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CARTING WITHOUT LICENSES.

There is a bylaw which provides that carters must have a license before they can do carting for a fee. A number about the city have been having their drays and other vehicles for hire and have not taken out a license.

These are now to be prosecuted, and twelve summonses were issued to some of the carters. They will come before Police Magistrate Love in the morning.

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
