HOSPITAL REPORT FOR PAST YEAR

Gratifying Record of Victoria Hospital.

Interesting Extracts From Dr. Balfour's Statistics.

No Quorum Yesterday at Hospital Trust Meeting, Which Adjourns for Three Weeks.

A meeting of the hospital trust was called for yesterday afternoon, but no quorum was obtainable. Mayor Rumball, Mr. T. H. Purdon, K. C., and Mr. James Gilmour, M. P., being absent from the city. Messrs. McCormick and Beck and Superintendent Balfour discussed informally several matters in connection with the hospital and its management. The board will meet on Friday, Nov. 8, unless a special meeting is found necessary in the meantime.

Superintendent Balfour presented his annual report for the year ending Sept. 30, 1901. A perusal of the report will show that it is a most gratifying one. The increase shown are in those particulars where increase was either desirable or uncontrollable, while the same is true of the decreases.

The report shows that the total income for the year just ended is \$19,144 85, made up as follows: From the Ontario Government, \$3,242 68; from Middlesex county, \$3,600 85; from paying patients, \$11,973 92; interest on endowment, \$437 57. Last year's total was \$19,207 72, the items being respectively \$2,707 69, \$1,776 46, \$7,421 16, and \$402 42.

The excess of income this year over last year is thus \$6,837 22.

Maintenance account this year totaled \$30,630 06, as against \$27,307 48 last year. This increase, however, was accompanied by a corresponding increase in the number of patients, 1,341 being treated this year as compared with 1,119 last year. Of this year's patients, 656 were males, 688 were females. The aggregate stay of patients was 32,570 days this year, while for last year the total was 28,208 days. A decrease of 2 cents per day is noticed in the per diem cost of each patient, this year's figures being 94 cents per day, as against 96 cents last year. The average length of each patient's stay was this year 24.23 days, while last year it was 25.2.

The city contribution to the main-in-charge was \$12,438 48, but of this amount \$1,667 76 was applied to capital account.

Capital expenditure amounted to \$1,667 76, made up of \$480 48 for alterations, additions and repairs to buildings; and \$1,187 30 house furnishings and furniture.

The city of London furnished 521 male and 576 female patients; from Middlesex county 87 males and 54 females; from other counties in Ontario, 41 males and 53 females; from the United States, 4 of each sex, and from all other countries 3 males and 1 female.

The religions of this year's patients are classified as follows: Protestants, 568 males and 637 females; Roman Catholics, 67 males and 41 females; other religions, 21 males and 10 females.

As might be expected the range of diseases and disorders treated was great, embracing every portion of the human body. There were 33 dislocations and 37 fractures of the limbs. Five cases of lead poisoning were treated. Sixty-eight patients were given treatment for bronchitis, while phthisis claimed 29 as its victims. Sixty-two females were treated for diseases and disorders peculiar to women. Of this number there were 22 abortions and 44 cases of parturition. Twenty-four suffered from appendicitis, and twenty-one cases of gunshot wound, the patient being a female.

WAS BORN IN THE EMERALD ISLE.

Late John Kincaid Was Postmaster of Loughgall, County Armagh.

Mr. John Kincaid, who died very suddenly at 8:30 a.m. yesterday, had been in his usual health until immediately before his death. Mr. Kincaid was born in county of Armagh, Ireland, in 1821, and was reared and educated there. In July, 1856, he married Miss Charlotte Orr, daughter of Jacob Orr, clerk of the peace at Loughgall, Ireland. Mr. Kincaid, shortly after his marriage was appointed postmaster of Loughgall, his native town, which position he occupied for a number of years, until he came to this country, in 1870. Upon his arrival here he went into business at Port Colborne, but remained there only a few months, and then came to London in 1872, he immediately identified himself with the business interests of this city, and has been for upwards of 30 years one of the best known and most respected citizens of London. He had a large circle of business and social friends, and has always been known as a man of the strictest integrity. Of a generous and affable disposition, his death will cause great regret among a large circle of friends.

His widow and two sons survive him and will have the sympathy of the whole community in their bereavement. His sons are: Mr. John Kincaid, of 355 Ridout street, and Dr. R. Kincaid of King street.
