A PAPAL DRIVE

How the Pope Takes an Airing in the Vatican Gardens, Attended by His Faithful Aides.

It was a bright, sunny October morning when the pope drove for the last time before the indisposition from which he is slowly recovering. His holiness, attended by his chaplain and the valet, Pio Cintra, moved slowly from the private apartments to the throne room, leaning heavily on his staff, a gift from the kaiser.

In the stately throne hall two Swiss halberdiers, two noble guardsmen, and the prelate on duty awaited for the holy father, and knelt when he appeared. The valet Cintra, an old retainer of the Pecci family, coming from Carpineto, the birthplace of the pope, helped the pontifinto a sedan chair, which four "sediari" in red damask gowns lifted.

The cortege moved, halberdiers in front, the two guards with drawn swords at either side of the slight vehicle, the priests and Cintra behind. They passed through the long corridor known as the Loggia of Raphael down to the yard of the Pappagaleo, where an open landau, lined in blue silk, was in readiness, writes a London Express correspondent.

The pope was supported into the back seat, and the prelate and chaplain sat in front, breviary in hand, in case his holiness felt inclined to say matins.

Leo, as usual, was dressed in white, with a broad-brimmed scarlet hat. The silm, bent figure, the wrinkled features, the ivory-colored skin, denoted his great age; but the eyes—bright, piercing, full of life—revealed the intense vitality of their nonogenarian owner. Four mounted guards of noble Roman lineage bent reverently down to the manes of their horses as Leo raised his shaky arm to bless—a blessing which is also a sign to move on, and the equipage enters the garden.

Meanwhile Plo Cintra, folowed by a staff of decorous domestics, has hobbled through a short cut to the Torre Leonina, the garden residence of the pope, placed at the further end, overlooking the old walls of den residence of the pope, placed at the further end, overlooking the old walls of Rome, and he bows when the carriage arrives, and ushers his beloved master within, where luncheon is on the table, and the easy chair is placed in a shaded corner of the papal siesta.

Rainbow at Midnight.

Seven Boers Killed and One Hundred and Thirty-One Captured.

London, Dec. 11 .- Lord Kitchener, in a dispatch from Standerton, Transvaal Colony, dated Tuesday, Dec. 10, announces that Gen. Bruce Hamilton, after a night march, surprised and captured practically the whole of the Boer Bethel command at Trichard's Fontein, early that morning. Seven Boers were killed and 131 were made

MORE TROOPS. London, Dec. 11.-Additional drafts for the militia yeomanry and the regulars are already being prepared for transportation to South Africa. The federal government of Australia is also considering the sending of fur-

ther contingents to South Africa. The Boer statesman, who appeared to be in excellent health, received a great ovation from crowds of people.

H. K. REDMOND'S PRAYER. A telegram from Dublin to the London Times says Mr. H. K. Redmond, M.P., speaking at a Gorey, county Wexford, meeting of the United Irish League, said there never was a time when there were better chances than the present to strike a blow for Ireland. Thanks be to God they had lived to see the days when John Bull has been caught by the throat by men in South Africa, who were giving him the greatest whaling he ever got. Redmond said he prayed God might strengthen the Boers until they danced on John Bull's chest.

FRENCH VICTORY IN WEST AFRICA.

Paris, Dec. 11.-An official cablegram received here from West Africa an-nounces the final destruction of the once formidable power of the late Sultan Rabah. The death of Rabah was announced in July 1900, but one of his sons, Sades-Ilath, has been giving the French trouble. The dispatch received says that a force of Spahis (French Arab cavalry) and native in-fantry surprised Saden-Ilath at the great number of his followers. Two days later the brother of Saden-Ilath and all their chiefs, with 1,500 men, surrendered with all their arms and ammunition. Of the French force seven native sharpshooters


