had no doubt it was a good thing in its place, but it should only be used as a check on bad legislation. It should come from the people, and should never be used except when asked for by them. He had always looked upon the licensing of the sale of intoxicating liquor as wrong, and he was happy to stand up and advocate the closing of the bars in the Province of Ontario as soon as possible. He would not say that they should stop the manufacture and importation of liquor, but if they could stop the retail sale that would be going as far as he thought they had a right to go. Mr. Martner declared his intention of voting with the government and the second reading of the bill because he would be accused of voting for party if he did not; upon the third reading he would move amendments which, he hoped, the house would endorse. He did not like the idea of having to get notice that a bill was coming, and he noted that the bill was jointly introduced by the two opposite views on the prohibition question. Mr. Martner declared his intention of voting with the government and the second reading of the bill because he would be accused of voting for party if he did not; upon the third reading he would move amendments which, he hoped, the house would endorse. He did not like the idea of having to get notice that a bill was coming, and he noted that the bill was jointly introduced by the two opposite views on the prohibition question.

Hon. E. J. Davis was delivering a speech on the bill when the government bill was introduced. The debate was continued after recess by Mr. Foy (Con., South Toronto), who said he would support the bill. Mr. Graham (Lib., Brockville) said Mr. Ross stood where he always stood as a temperance leader, but he had to stand between the two opposite views on the prohibition question. Mr. Hoyle (Con., New Ontario) said he would support the bill, though in entire sympathy with the temperance cause. Mr. Pardee (Lib., West Lambton), defended the bill, and Mr. Crawford (Con., West Toronto) said as a temperance man he would oppose such a loaded referendum. The question was then put and the second reading carried, 48 to 35, Mr. Martner voting with the government.

BANISH THE BARBERRY SHRUB.

Hon. Mr. Dryden has introduced his bill to deal with the barberry shrub. It provides a penalty of \$10 and costs on anyone who shall hereafter plant, cultivate or sell the barberry shrub. Provision is also made that where the shrub is at present growing in any city, town or village, it may be removed by the district council or committee of agriculture of three ratepayers in any adjoining municipality. Provision is also made for small compensation in such cases.

OPEN SEASONS CHANGED.

Hon. Mr. Latchford has introduced a bill to amend the Ontario game protection act. It provides that the open season for moose, caribou, and reindeer in the district south of the C. P. R. main line between Mattawa and Port Arthur shall remain as at present—Nov. 1-15, but that the open season for deer in the district south of the C. P. R. main line shall be from Oct. 1 to Nov. 15. A special provision is introduced granting an open season for wild turkeys in the district south of the C. P. R. main line from Oct. 1 to Nov. 15. The close season for quail and wild turkeys is made Oct. 15 to Dec. 1, instead of Dec. 15.

Supplementary Estimates.

The supplementary estimates, which were laid on the table of the legislature this afternoon, call for expenditures amounting to \$181,947. The largest item is \$45,000, to cover the cost of the referendum vote. Among the other items are \$2,000 for the analysis of sewage impregnated with noxious chemicals; \$200 for the Eastern Ontario Good Roads Association; \$500 for the Salvation Army prison gate work; \$200 for the Infants' Home and Infirmary; \$1,500 to pay Pan-American Exposition accounts; \$5,000 for the board of trade, to assist manufacturers of Ontario to make their products better known in the markets of Great Britain; \$500 towards monument at Kingston to the late Sir George. Other charges are: \$2,550 for civil government, including \$3,000 for extra help, etc., in the military land grants; \$1,467 for administration of justice; \$5,000 for the Ontario Agricultural College; \$1,500 for technical education; \$500 for public institutions' maintenance; \$16,350 for agriculture, including \$5,000 to enlarge the Winter Fair buildings at Guelph; \$2,000 for the Ontario Agricultural College; \$4,000 for special dairy instruction; \$200 for the Sugar Beet Association; \$1,500 for the Agricultural College library; \$1,000 for sugar beet experiments.

The sum of \$15,000 is asked for maintenance and repairs. Under public buildings the vote is \$38,949, including \$5,000 for improvements at London Asylum; \$900 for improvements at Osgoode Hall; \$2,500 for site of MacDonald building at O. A. C. Guelph; \$2,199 for improvements at Mercer Reformatory and payment to city re King street sewer; \$9,000 for duplicate electric lighting plant at O. A. C. Guelph; \$2,500 for the board of trade, to assist manufacturers of Ontario to make their products better known in the markets of Great Britain; \$500 towards monument at Kingston to the late Sir George. Other charges are: \$2,550 for civil government, including \$3,000 for extra help, etc., in the military land grants; \$1,467 for administration of justice; \$5,000 for the Ontario Agricultural College; \$1,500 for technical education; \$500 for public institutions' maintenance; \$16,350 for agriculture, including \$5,000 to enlarge the Winter Fair buildings at Guelph; \$2,000 for the Ontario Agricultural College; \$4,000 for special dairy instruction; \$200 for the Sugar Beet Association; \$1,500 for the Agricultural College library; \$1,000 for sugar beet experiments.

Under public works, \$30,200 is asked, including \$2,500 for Rainy River docks; also several grants for extensive drainage schemes. A further sum of \$24,000 is asked for colonization roads. Charges on crown lands of \$6,500 include \$5,000 for fire ranging beyond the height of land.

THE PROHIBITION DEBATE.

The prohibition debate was next resumed, and Mr. Martner (Con.), of North Toronto, was the first speaker. He declared himself opposed to recognition of liquor traffic in any form. The question was a moral one and above all politics, but he wanted it thoroughly understood that he spoke only for himself and in no way for his party or any section of it. He was in good company, though, for Sir Oliver Mowat, Sir William Meredith, the present leader of the opposition, the premier and other distinguished gentlemen had all expressed the view that the liquor traffic was an evil which was responsible for most of the crime and misery of the country. He dwelt for some time on the terrible effects of the drink habit, from which he jumped to a consideration of the course which the government had pursued with regard to the question. They had said to the people, "Give us your mandate and we will give you prohibition." Had they done so? He did not need to reply to that question. He need only say that we were still without prohibition. With respect to the referendum, he
