THE PROHIBITION DEBATE. The prohibition debate was next resumed, and Mr. Marter (Con.), of North Toronto, was the first speaker. He declared himself opposed to recognition of liquor traffic in any form. The question was a moral one and above all politics, but he wanted it thoroughly understood that he spoke only for himself and in no way for his party or any section of it. He was in good company, though, for Sir Oliver Mowat, Sir William Meredith, the present leader of the opposition, the premier, and other distinguished gentlemen had all expressed the view that the liquor traffic was an evil which was responsible for most of the crime and misery of the country. He dwelt for some time on the terrible effects of the drink habit, from which he jumped to a consideration of the course which the government had pursued with regard to the question. They had said to the people, "Give us your mandate and we will give you prohibition." Had they done so? He did not need to reply to that question. He need only say that were still without prohibition. With respect to the referendum, he

should never be used except when ask-ed for by them. He had always looked upon the licensing of the sale of in-toxicating liquor as wrong, and he was toxicating induor as wrong, and he was happy to stand up and advocate the closing of the bars in the Province of Ontario as soon as possible. He would not say that they should stop the manufacture and importation of liquor, but if they could stop the retail calls that would be going as far tail sale that would be going as far as he thought they had a right to go.

Mr. Marter declared his intention of voting with the government on the second reading of the bill because he would be accused of voting for party if he did not; but upon the third reading he would move amendments which, he hoped, the house would indorse. He did not like the idea of having to get more than a bare majority vote. The prohibitionists had enough to do to get out more than a half of the votes cast in the plebiscites. Sir John Mac-donald had once said that he would give the people prohibition when they sent men to parliament to demand it. and there was no doubt it behooved the prohibitionists to take an active interest in the next campaign and see that their interests were conserved. forcible address in defense of the gov-

Hon. E. J. Davis was delivering a ernment bill when recess time arrived. The debate was continued after recess by Mr. Foy (Con., South Toronto), who said the bill was bad.

Mr. Graham (Lib., Brockville) said Mr. Ross stood where he always stood as a temperance leader, but he had to legislate for the great middle class, who stood between the two opposite views on the prohibition question Mr. Hoyle (Con., New Ontario) said he would record his vote against the

bill, though in entire sympathy with the temperance cause. Mr. Pardee (Lib., West Lambton), defended the measure. Mr. Crawford (Con., West Toronto) said as a temperance man he would oppose such a loaded referendum.

Mr. Lucas (Con., Center Grey) spoke against the bill. The question was then put and the second reading carried, 48 to 35, Mr. Marter voting with the government.

BANISH THE BARBERRY SHRUB. Hon. Mr. Dryden has introduced his bill to deal with the barberry shrub. It provides a penalty of \$10 and costs on anyone who shall hereafter plant, cultivate or sell the barberry shrub. Provision is also made that where the shrub is at present growing in any city, town or village, it may be removed on the petition to the minister of agriculture of three ratepayers in any adjoining municipality. Provision is also made for small compensation in such cases.

OPEN SEASONS CHANGED. Hon. Mr. Latchford has introduced a bill to amend the Ontario game protection act. It provides that the open season for moose, reindeer and caribou in the district south of the C. P. R. main line between Mattawa and Port Arthur shall remain as at present-Nov. 1-15-but that in the regions west and north of that section of the C. P. the open season shall be from Oct. 16 to Nov. 15. A special provision is introduced granting an open season for deer kept on preserves from Oct. 1 to Nov. 15. The close season for quail and wild turkeys is made Oct. 15 to Dec. 1, instead of Dec. 15.

Supplementary Estimates.

The supplementary estimates, which were laid on the table of the legisla ture this afternoon, call for expenditures amounting to \$181,947. The largest item is \$45,000, to cover the cost of the referendum vote. Among the other items are \$2,000 for the analysis of sewage impregated with noxious chemicals: \$200 for the Eastern Ontario Good Roads Association; \$500 for the Salvation Army prison gate work; \$200 for the Infants' Home and Infirmary; \$1,500 to pay Pan-American Exposition accounts: \$5,000 for the board of trade, to assist manufacturers of Ontario to make their products better known in wards monument at Kingston to the late Sir George Kirkpatrick.
