JAMES AND MARTIN MORDEN WOULD NOT RETURN TO GIVE THEIR EVIDENCE

Crown Authorities Went for Them to Iowa, But They Refused to Come Back.

Their Testimony at Last Court Read by Lawyers.

WILL ADMITTED AS EVIDENCE

Judge Ruled That Foundation Was Established—Gerald's Statement to Arva Minister.

The longest sitting yet held in the Sifton murder trial was that of Wednesday, when court opened at 9:30 a.m. and closed at 6:30 p.m., with an hour's recess for luncheon. Excellent progress continues to be made in the getting in of evidence, judge and counsel alike showing their desire to facilitate matters.

Wednesday's evidence was contributed chiefly by Dr. McNeill and Mary Macfarlane, while important testimony was also given by Rev. W. H. Cooper, Mrs. Huldah Macfarlane and other witnesses. Dr. McNeill told practically the same story as he did at both the preliminary examination and the previous trial. While his testimony would appear to be damaging, its effect must be weakened by Dr. McNeill's firm adherence to the opinion that Joseph Sifton's death was accidental.

The crowds in attendance yesterday were the largest yet experienced during the course of the trial, fully half of those present being women and girls. Counsel several times complained of the annoyance they met with from the ingress and egress of spectators.

MARY MACFARLANE TESTIFIES.

Mary Macfarlane, the girl who was to have married Joseph H. Sifton on the day which brought his death instead of his marriage, followed Dr. McNeill in the witness box. She was allowed to sit down owing to her recent illness. She testified that she is at present living with her mother, but that at the time of Joseph Sifton's death she was employed as a domestic at Gerald's house. Joseph Sifton had lived at Waterloo and she went there, but he had left and gone to live at his own place some months before his death.

Witness had been engaged to marry Joseph Sifton for several months before his death, but the date of the marriage had only been fixed two days before Mr. Sifton had obtained the license. Rev. Mr. Cooper was to marry them.

Gerald only heard of the marriage on the night of Friday, June 28. John Macfarlane, brother of the witness, came and told Gerald. Then Joseph Sifton drove into Gerald's yard with a buggy to take witness to see her mother. Witness was coming out of the cellar when she met Gerald. Gerald asked if she was to marry his father and witness told him she was. Gerald said that was all right, only he wanted to tell the witness that he was asked if there was anything wrong, and witness said she thought there was.

Witness then went up to her room to get ready to go out. She saw Mrs. Gerald upstairs and had a conversation with her.

WENT TO EDGAR MORDEN'S.

Witness and Joseph Sifton went together to the house of her mother. Witness went in and Joseph stayed outside. Witness and Joseph Sifton drove back to Gerald's about 11 o'clock and sat together in the buggy for some time before witness got out. When witness went to leave the buggy, Edgar Morden came to them and told Joseph Sifton something which caused them to go to Edgar Morden's house, where they stayed all night. About 5 o'clock in the morning witness and Sifton left and drove to the latter's father's house about 6 o'clock. Joseph Sifton went to the barn and did the chores, then spoke to Mr. Bathurst. Then he went to the hayfork track. Joseph Sifton called back that he did not feel well enough to work that day. Gerald answered that if his father would show where he wanted it, he and Herbert would put it up. Gerald saw witness and said "Good morning, Mary."

HAD FALLEN FROM THE BARN.

Gerald went out to the barn. Joseph Sifton finished dressing and went out too, witness accompanying him to the door. Joseph Sifton carried nothing with him. Witness waited a while and went out to look for Joseph Sifton, went back, then went out again and met Herbert and he said Mr. Sifton had fallen out of the barn and killed himself. Witness went to the corner of the barn, saw Sifton lying on his back with his head to the north and then ran back to the house for some water. Witness hurried back and was going to put water in Sifton's face, but John Sinker stopped her. Witness washed the patient's face after he was carried into the house.

Witness went to Gerald's house that afternoon on the invitation of Mrs. Gerald and stayed there for some days. Gerald told her she was to stay there as long as she liked and have everything she wanted while it she ever got married she was to have \$1,000.

GERALD SAW MARTIN MORDEN.

Gerald told witness on the Friday night before Joseph Sifton died he had gone to London to tell Martin Morden of the approaching marriage, as he thought it his duty to tell him. Witness had known Martin for about two years, and had been engaged to Martin for a couple of months before being engaged to Joseph Sifton.

Witness objected to a question as to whether Gerald told witness of his going anywhere else that Friday night.

Judge Britton allowed the question to be asked.

Witness' reply was that she could not remember.

TOO MUCH IRRELEVANCE.

Mr. Johnston then began his examination of the witness, which was practically a repetition of that at the previous trial. Witness said that she had not obtained her mother's consent to her marriage with Joseph Sifton. Witness had not told Martin Morden that she was to marry Joseph Sifton.

Witness said that when she first saw Mr. Sifton lying at the end of the barn he was lying on his side, and that John Sinker afterwards turned him on his back. Sinker swore yesterday that he was lying on his back when he arrived.

Mr. Johnston was questioning the witness rather closely as to certain particulars she had had with the Mordens. Judge Britton interrupted with a protest against what he considered a multiplying of irrelevant details. John Johnston thereupon finished his cross-examination with a testy "That's all."

"DON'T TELL OF MY TREATS."

Mary Macfarlane was followed on the stand by her mother, Mrs. Huldah Macfarlane. Mrs. Macfarlane told of Mary and Joseph Sifton coming to her house on Friday night. She told also of going early the next morning (Saturday, June 30) to Gerald's house, where she told Gerald that Mary and Joseph Sifton were to be married that day by Rev. W. H. Cooper. Witness advised Gerald to go to Mr. Cooper and see if they were married. Gerald said "If they're married, all right, I'll put them in a way that they won't be married today." Witness replied, "Don't tell of my treats."

Two days before he was arrested, Gerald was at the house of witness' married daughter in London. He then said to witness that he and Herbert would probably be "taken in" in a few days, and he asked that witness, if called to give evidence, should not mention the threat he had made that morning. Mr. Johnston showed that witness last year said that Gerald's exact words were "What we were talking about that morning" instead of "threat."

BAD FEELING EXISTED.

Witness said there had been bad feeling between herself and family and the Siftons since the tragedy. She would not swear that she had never said that she would do her part to help Gerald. She did not remember saying it.

Witness acknowledged having said to Gerald that she had rather it was Mr. Morden than her marriage to Joseph Sifton.

Witness could not remember whether she had made a certain statement before the marriage or before the grand jury. She had made it before one or another. Mr. Johnston produced the writ of indictment and showed that witness' name did not appear on the back in the list of witnesses heard before the grand jury.

"Would you have us believe that the crown has been bringing witnesses before the grand jury and concealing the fact from us?"

"Yes, I was sworn before the grand jury in another room here in the courthouse," answered the witness decisively.

"Then I
