Japs After Sakhalien.

St. Petersburg, March 26. - Gen. Linevitch, in a dispatch dated March 25. reports no change in the position of the armies. An imperial order relieves Gen. Gripenberg of the command of the second Manchurian army, but permits him to remain as aide-decamp to the Emperor.

According to Government mail advices brought to the mainland from Sakhanen and telegraphed from Kharborovsky, the Japanese were expected to land at Korsakovsk within a fortnight, the port being free of ice early in April. The Russians are not in a position to resist, the whole force on the island being less than 2,000 soldiers and prison guards, There are 6,000 convicts in the camps, mainder of the population consisting of 3,000 natives and 6,000 time-expired convicts' wives and children who have settled in the island. The prospect that the convicts may be landed on the mainland in the vicinity of Vladivo-Six stock by the Japanese is being con-

Tokio, March 26.-Noon,-The following official dispatch has been received here: "Our Singking force reports that the enemy retreated from Singking toward Hautungchou, 90 miles northeast. Another report is that one squadron of the enemy's cavalry halted at Mienhuachien, on the Kirin road, in the district between Piyouanpomen and Changtu, and in the vicinity of Taiseiyei. At Kankoshi a few of the enemy's troops are appearing. Natives report Aishenkou, nine miles north of Wanmasai, and 600 infantry and cavalry Conservative Organizer Succumbs to at Taotu, fifteen miles east of Wanmasai, Changtu reports a few troopers in the district twenty miles north-

ward of Chinchiatun, 23 miles northeast of Fakoman. Reports do not trace the enemy from Kankpin, thirteen miles northwest of Fakoman, but some troops from Liao Yang and Wopeng are 25 miles north of Kangpin." The railway between Mukden and Kaiyuan has been restored and traffic resumed. The railway bridge across the Hun River has not yet been thoroughly repaired and traffic is still in terrupted there.

Captured Russian Nurses.

Gunshu Pass, March 26. - Everywhere along the front there is complete and ominous quietude. Collisions have been reported today. A nurse arriving from Mukden today states that the reports by Chinese of ill. treatment of Russian sick and wounded after the evacuation of Mukden are entirely unfounded. The Japanese treated all who fell into their hands in the most kindly manner, and gave the nurses permission to return to the Russian army, saying there were no women of that avocation with the Japanese advanced column. They provided the nurses with credentials, dicated the roads by which they might travel, and warned them that they might be under fire west of the railway. Several doctors, sisters and attendants remained with the wounded at Mukden.

BIG ELECTRIC MERGER

Combination of American and Canadian Lines Talked Of.

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 25. Rumors are current here that the New York Central is forming the greatest electric railway merger ever attempted. Apparently reliable information is that the international railway system which recently changed hands from the Ely to the Pierce interests, is now under New York Central control. It is further stated that the syndicate, of which Frederick Nicholls, of Toronto, is the head, and which owns the Electric Development Company of Ontario, the Toronto and Niagara Power Company, the Toronto and Hamilton Railway Company and the Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto system is acting for the New York Central in combining Canadian electrical interests for the coming international merger. It is said that the new Toronto and Hamilton Railway will be used to give the New York Central a four-track route to Toronto. Watch them pass their plates along. new Toronto and Hamilton Railway
