CROOK DEPARTED SERVED HALF-TIME

Chatham, May 20.—Eddie Quinn, the noted thief, sentenced to three years in Kingston for value switching on the Sovereign Bank clerk at Tilbury, has been deported to the United States after serving half his sentence. Quinn's pal, Fritz Dieben, now serving a ten-year sentence for the same affair and who was largely convicted by Quinn's evidence, has sworn to kill Quinn when he gets out.

STEAMER SANK TUG AND STRUCK TRAWLER

Steamer Invermore on the Newfoundland Route Was on the Rampage.

Halifax, May 19.—The steamer Invermore, which left North Sydney at 1:30 a.m., was in collision with the large French trawler Beluga, and had been but about one hour out when she returned with a hole stove in her bow. The trawler arrived in port shortly after in a badly damaged condition, and making water. As Captain Charlotte of the trawler endeavored to dock his boat at the Dominion wharf the effort was attended with further disaster and almost loss of life. The steam tug Zedee was lying at the head of the wharf, in charge of Captain Nesbitt and Engineer Coggin. Without a moment's notice the big iron steamer crashed into the tug, and she sank immediately. The steamer Invermore is on the route between North Sydney and Newfoundland, in place of the Bruce which is now in drydock. She had on board 50 passengers and a crew of 35 officers and men. The Beluga's crew numbered 30 men. Engineer Coggin, of the Zedee, had a narrow escape from drowning as the tug went down.

A MOVE TOWARDS PEACE

The Hague to Take Up Proposal for Court of Arbitral Justice.

Mohank Lake, N. Y., May 14.—James Brown Scott, solicitor of the state department, and a delegate to The Hague conference, brought to the Lake Mohank conference on international arbitration today an "authoritative and directed" quotation from Secretary of State Knox, predicting that the third Hague conference would find a permanent court of arbitral justice in session at The Hague, and that many powers were accepting the proposition at least in principle. President Nicholas Murray Butler expressed the thanks of the conference to Secretary Knox for the announcement. Charles Henry Butler, reporter of the supreme court, referred to the exclusion of warships from the Great Lakes by agreement in 1817 between Great Britain and the United States, as an instance of the limitation of armaments. Congress, he said, has often been importuned in behalf of local shipyards for an abrogation of this agreement in order to promote the building of a warship there, but investigations had always sustained

OPPOSES RECIPROCITY

A. E. Kemp Wants Trade Developed With Empire Colonies.

Montreal, Que., May 19.—Mr. A. E. Kemp, of Toronto, past president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, who is here attending a meeting of the executive of the association, places himself on record in an interview, as being opposed to reciprocity with the United States. Mr. Kemp contends that Canada's hope lies in the direction of extending trade with the other country and the British colonies.

FIRE AT IROQUOIS

Several Buildings Destroyed by Early Morning Blaze Yesterday.

Iroquois, Ont., May 19.—Iroquois was visited early this morning by a fire which destroyed C. E. Keeler's tin shop and contents, and the adjoining dwelling of Mrs. Amos Hervis and contents, both buildings on Main street, as well as a drive shed belonging to M. F. Beach's flour mill, next the river front. Loss about \$3,500; partially insured.

FEELING RUNS HIGH

Citizens of Shawville Indignant Over Acquittal of Gypsy Murphy.

Ottawa, May 19.—Mr. R. N. Venning, assistant commissioner of fisheries, left this afternoon for The Hague, where he will assist in the presentation of the Canada and Newfoundland case in the North Atlantic fisheries dispute which comes up for hearing next month. An indignation meeting was held by the citizens of Shawville, Que., last night to protest against the manner in which Michael Murphy, the gypsy who shot and killed two young men of the village last month, had escaped punishment through a verdict of acquittal rendered by the jury at Bryson yesterday afternoon. Feeling against Murphy runs very high, and if he comes back to the village serious trouble is likely. Murphy, it is said, has threatened to burn up the whole village in order to "get even," and the citizens last night decided to have special watchmen engaged as long as Murphy is known to be anywhere in the neighborhood.

HIT AT AVLESWORTH

Seaford, Ont., May 19.—At the annual meeting of the Goderich district of the Methodist Church, convened in Seaford today, a resolution, moved by Rev. T. J. Snowden, and seconded by Dr. Dougall, was passed commending the earnest efforts of H. H. Miller, M. P., to secure the passage of the bill to suppress gambling in connection with race meets in this country, and condemning the action of the Minister of Justice in opposing the bill as strongly as he did, and also his action in securing the pardon of the Toronto men committed to prison for sale of immoral literature, as being "antagonistic to the best interests of the future morals in this country, and unworthy of him as the guardian of law and order."
