SEEKING US IN THE NORTH

London Rolling Strongly, But Fell Four Short of Beating Ottawa in Heavy Hitting Contest — Frankie Fuller Again Stars for Senators — Morgan Hit Hard

OTTAWA, May 31.—Ottawa beat London in the second game of the series today, 14 to 10. For four and a half innings the contest was a dead game. In Ottawa's fifth the champions gave Morgan, a right-hand youngster, the front lambasting ever seen at Lansdowne Park. Twelve men came to bat in this round and from his offerings three singles, a double, two triples and a home run accounted for seven earned runs. Not stopping at this, the champions gathered three more in the sixth, one in the seventh and two in the eighth.

Tom Robert, who was on the rubber for Shaugnessy's men, was not very brilliant, but he kept the Londoners at bay with a ten-run lead down to the third, seven runs crossing the rubber before the side was retired. Errors and solid hitting accounted for the rest of the score.

A Record For Hits. It has been some time since so much free hitting has been seen in a Canadian League game in the capital. Indeed yesterday's game was a record. Thirty-four safe smashes were recorded. Reising's bunch accounting for eighteen, seven being obtained in the last round. The Senators, however, hit harder. Their total bases numbering 57, they were the only team to get a hit in every inning. Fuller was again in the front with a slashing home run in the fifth, with one on, the ball looked ordinary enough for three bases, and was relayed to the infield before the speedy boy rounded third.
