

'GHOST' CAPTURED AT THAMES PARK-- FOUR GOT AWAY

Horton Street Residents Declare One Seen Sunday Was Different.

Not every day do citizens have a chance to see a ghost, but when the chance comes they certainly avail themselves of it. The advertiser published a story in the evening edition yesterday to the effect that ghostly visitors were seen in Thames Park, Sunday evening. That was enough to attract a large number of people, who gathered there to see the fitting object. They literally stormed the park. Young couples kept close together, systematically turning around to see if their quest was closing in on them. Every time the wind moaned through the trees a nifty feeling went down the spine of the ghost hunters.

They waited and watched. It was 9 o'clock, then half past, and still no ghost put in an appearance. The crowd grew restless. Some of the more nervous ventured into the bushes, but still Mr. or Mrs. Ghost did not give an exhibition of Greek dancing as on the night previous.

Just as the bells at St. Paul's were announcing 9:45 o'clock some of the crowd saw something white in the air and amongst the trees. They rubbed their eyes. Afraid that their imagination was playing them false, but "behold" there was not the case. The unthoughtful ghost which made Thames Park its playground had put in an appearance.

Red-Blooded Ghost. About this time T. Mercer, who resides at 520 Princess Avenue, was employed at the hydro station, quit work. He had read all about the alleged ghost, so, as he said, "I decided to investigate it." He did investigate, with the result that Mr. Ghost was caught red-handed. What had attracted so many citizens to the scene was not a real red-headed man. It was lucky for the prank-player that the police department had not dispatched a constable to assist in the search. If they had it is most likely that Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon would have had to deal with a Mr. Live Ghost in police court this morning.

When captured the prank-player was draped with a sheet. He denies, however, that he had anything to do with either of the ghosts which were seen on Sunday night.

Four Others. The ghost which was captured was but one of four or five. The others escaped. The performance, however, went badly from the first. As the ghost ran down towards the water's edge from the park at a point nearly opposite Thames street, most of the people on the opposite bank assumed that they were men in white shirts. Along the edge of the water several of the ghosts commenced dancing. The fashion of symbolic Greek dancers, but the sheet which one carried unwound rather awkwardly, and for a moment hung down, flung wide and square like the sail of a boat. Somebody in the park gave chase, and the ghosts, all except the one who was captured, took refuge in the shrubbery. The other one ran along the edge of the water towards the bank near the water tower. A few people standing on the bank near the water tower imagined they had seen the ghost, but Leroy Washington, incorrectly referred to in a previous story as "Rastus," declared that the performance was in no way similar to what he believes was a genuine ghostly exhibition on Sunday night. He is quite certain it was a real ghost that appeared on Sunday night. And several other people corroborated his evidence.

CONTRACTORS AHEAD
OF SCHEDULE WITH
NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Delayed Delivery of White Stone Temporarily Held Work Up.

Two-thirds of the brickwork has been completed on the new central collegiate institute and fully one-half of all the work is done, according to President Harvey of the Kingston Construction Company, who is personally superintending the work.

The steel work is all in place and the inner walls completed. Greater progress would have been made with the outer walls but for the fact that the construction company has been held up through delayed delivery of the white stone of which the outer walls are to be built. The building will be fireproof throughout, cement floors and cement ceilings, strengthened by heavy wire mesh, leaving no place for fire to work. There will be a wood floor in the gymnasium, but the outer floors will be of concrete. The basement is practically finished, and includes clubrooms, drillrooms, lunchrooms, storage rooms for bicycles, and rooms for indoor recreation.

It is hoped to have the work completed by December 1. Mr. Harvey states, although the contract allows until January 1, 1932, for completing the work. "We are well ahead of our schedule time at present," said Mr. Harvey.

HELL IS SEPARATION OF SOUL AND ITS CREATOR

Declares Rev. A. C. Bingham in Spirited Sermon.

Like the singing of a bird in a storm, declared Rev. A. C. Bingham during his sermon at Egerton Street Baptist Church on Sunday night, are the words: "Seek the Lord while he may be found, call ye Him while He is near." Isa. lv. 6. The subject of his address was, "An Urgent Admonition."

Continuing he declared, "These words are sweeter than the silvery echoes of a cornet heard on the lake in the quiet of a calm summer evening. Isaiah earnestly admonishes everyone to seek the Lord. Two conditions were pictured in the admonition, need and separation. As he said, 'God and man it's the man who does the separating. Adam hid from God; the prodigal went into a far country; Peter followed afar off. The greatest barrier to man's salvation is man's hostility to a merciful God.'"

"When there is no fellowship between the human soul and God, that soul is dead, just as when in an auto there is no fellowship between the gasoline and the engine, that engine is dead. What is hell? he asked and replied, 'Hell is when the condition of separation between the human soul and God becomes permanent. The fire of hell is the eternal regret and anguish of a soul separated from its Creator.'"

"God's day of mercy, the opportunity for fellowship with himself, does not last forever. The preacher who would lead a man to God for 120 years, but only eight took the opportunity of safety comes and goes for every man, and the question that Jesus propounded still echoes in our ears, 'What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?'"

Sunday was the fifth anniversary of the ministry of Rev. Mr. Bingham as pastor of the Egerton street church.

DR. ERNEST YOUNG TAKEN BY DEATH

Was Assistant Superintendent of Ontario Hospital For Several Years.

Dr. Ernest H. Young, assistant superintendent of the Ontario Hospital for Insane, died there yesterday.

Dr. Young was born in Guelph and is a son of William and Mrs. Young of that city. He received his primary education there.

The deceased was a graduate of Toronto University and has been engaged in neuro-psychiatry in the Ontario hospitals for insane at Kingston and in this city since graduation.

In 1916 Dr. Young joined No. 10 Stationary Hospital and proceeded to France with that unit, where he did important neurological work.

He held the rank of major while serving overseas. Returning to Canada in May, 1920, Dr. Young resumed his duties here.

He was a member of the American Medical Association and the Ontario Neuro-Psychiatric societies.

Besides his wife, father and mother, Dr. Young is survived by one son and one daughter, aged four and eight years, respectively, and two brothers, William of Guelph, Dr. Clarence, Little Current, Manitoulin Island, and Dr. William, a dentist of Elmira, Ont.

His sisters, Miss Mabel, lady superintendent City Hospital, Dixon, Ill., and Miss Ethel at home.

The funeral will be held in Guelph on Wednesday.

POSTHUMOUS AWARDS RECEIVED BY SGT. DRUMMER NANFAN

Victory and Service Medals For Son Killed in Action.

Yesterday Sergt.-Drummer A. W. Nanfan, 524 Central Avenue, received from the department of militia and defence his posthumous awards for his son, the late Private A. F. Nanfan, 7630, the Victory medal and ribbon and the Service medal and ribbon.

The medals were accompanied by a formal note from the minister of militia expressing regret that Pte. Nanfan had not lived to receive the awards personally.

Strange Coincidence. By strange coincidence the medals arrived on the third anniversary of the day on which Pte. Nanfan along with his unit, the 2nd C. M. R., went into the line, which he two days later, August 10, 1918, made the supreme sacrifice. The action was the beginning of the end, the 100 days which led to the final crushing of the power of the Hun and which made possible the return of the war-racked world to thoughts of peace.

Pte. Nanfan enlisted in the R. C. R. and was in K Company, which left for active service in August, 1914, but at
