ACCIDENTAL DEATH IS JURY'S VERDICT

Samuel Apple Killed by Rupture of Heart—No One To Blame.

A coroner's jury, investigating the death of Samuel Apple, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Apple, 427 Bathurst street, at police station last night, concluded that the boy died from a ruptured heart, a medical rarity, caused either from a severe blow or heavy fall.

Samuel Apple, according to the evidence, was struck on the head by a door at the Webster Construction Company, Bathurst street, which had blown shut upon him during Friday's windstorm. Directly after the lad was hit he ran across the road, stumbled on the sidewalk and fell. He was taken to Victoria hospital at once, but was dead when admitted.

No responsibility for the fatality was attached to the Webster Construction Company.

Post Mortem Performed.

A post mortem was performed by Dr. F. W. Luney, instructor in pathology at the institute of public health. He stated that death was due to shock and hemorrhage following a rupture of the heart. A severe blow or fall would cause the condition, he said, but it would be possible for the boy to run some distance after the rupture. A case of this nature was comparatively rare to medical science, the physician declared. He said that he had never seen such a case before.

J. D. Jacobs, 864 William street, and George Leslie, 133 Wilson avenue, employees of the Webster Construction Company, both said that they were engaged in unloading wire from a wagon near the heavy doors which struck young Apple at the time of the accident. Jacobs said he had opened the doors himself and knew that they were securely propped

against the walls to prevent them from slamming shut. The men declared that on many occasions they had warned Apple and his brothers and other children to stay away from the construction company, knowing that it was a dangerous place for them to play.

Following is the jury's verdict: "That Samuel Apple came to his death on Nov. 7, 1924, from rupture of the heart due to shock received either from a blow in the back caused by a swinging door driven by a gust of wind at the Webster Construction Company, or from a fall caused by stumbling on the sidewalk and falling forward violently after running across the street following the blow from the door.

"To which of these causes the rupture of the heart was due it was impossible from the evidence for the jurors to decide. Employees of the company were unloading a truck at the time, and the deceased had no occasion to be there at all and had been requested repeatedly to keep away.

Impossible to Determine.

"Whether the prop which guarded the door from swinging was disturbed by children playing about the premises or fell down from the action of the high wind it is impossible to determine.

"In any case the jurors are of the opinion that under the circumstances the Webster Construction Company cannot be held responsible for the fatality."

Coroner Dr. Robert Ferguson presided over the inquest and the jurors included Robert Ross, Joseph Good, Benjamin Tripp, G. W. Forest, Adam Blay, Arthur Mann, E. S. Bice and William Richmond. Albert M. Jude appeared for the crown.

Ten witnesses testified. They were: James Gerrard, 228 Burwell street; G. L. Murray, 427 Rectory street; J. D. Jacobs, 864 William street; George Leslie, 133 Wilson avenue; Dr. Post, chief of staff at Victoria hospital; and Dr. F. W. Luney of the institute of public health; Mrs. Ada Livingstone, 265 Burwell street; George H. Vahm, and Mrs. Morris Apple, 427 Bathurst street, father of the dead boy.

PROGRESS MADE IN MEDICAL WORK

Board of Education Makes Rapid Headway in Special Work.

Definite progress was made at the meeting held yesterday afternoon of the special committee appointed by the board of education to secure all possible information with regard to medical supervision in the city schools.

As a member of the committee, Trustee Dr. Alfred J. Grant suggested that the committee might be able to secure valuable information on the subject under consideration from the provincial department of education, from the Western Ontario academy of medicine and from other towns and cities where medical supervision to a varying degree is in force.

Trustee Rev. R. D. Mess emphasized the fact that the committee should approach the subject from the standpoint of public health and the prevention of disease, not merely the curing of disease.

The committee is, therefore, calling a round table conference of all parties interested to meet with officials from whom information may be secured. The conference is to be held in the board room of the board of education some evening in the near future.

Those who will be present at the conference, besides the members of the special committee, Trustees Rev. R. D. Mess, Dr. A. J. Grant, Rev. Quintin Warner, Geo. F. Copeland, Mrs. John I. A. Hunt and Mrs. John A. Rose, are: A committee to be appointed by the Western Ontario academy of medicine; Dr. V. P. Fair, medical officer of the provincial department of education, Toronto; Dr. H. W. Hill, director of the institute of public health; Dr. T. J. MacNally, district medical officer of health, London; Dr. W. Downham, medical officer of health; Mrs. W. A. Tanner, president of the union mothers' club; Senior Inspector V. K. Greer, Principal E. A. Miller of the collegiate institute, and Principal H. B. Bedd of the technical high school.

COMMITTEE HEARS REPORT ON CENTRAL COLLEGIATE

The regular meeting of No. 3 committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon lasted but twenty minutes. Only matters of a routine character were considered.

The committee set aside the sum of \$100 for the purpose of running the amusement tax department in connection with the auditorium of the central collegiate institute.

Principal E. A. Miller of the collegiate institute, reported the fact that central collegiate had been successful in winning the three Carter scholarships in the county of Middlesex this year.

Accounts totalling \$2,324.95 were approved by the committee.

Trustee S. F. Lawason, who resigned from the board on Nov. 6, was absent from the meeting, as were Trustees Mrs. John I. A. Hunt and A. R. Cairncross, both of whom are out of the city at present.

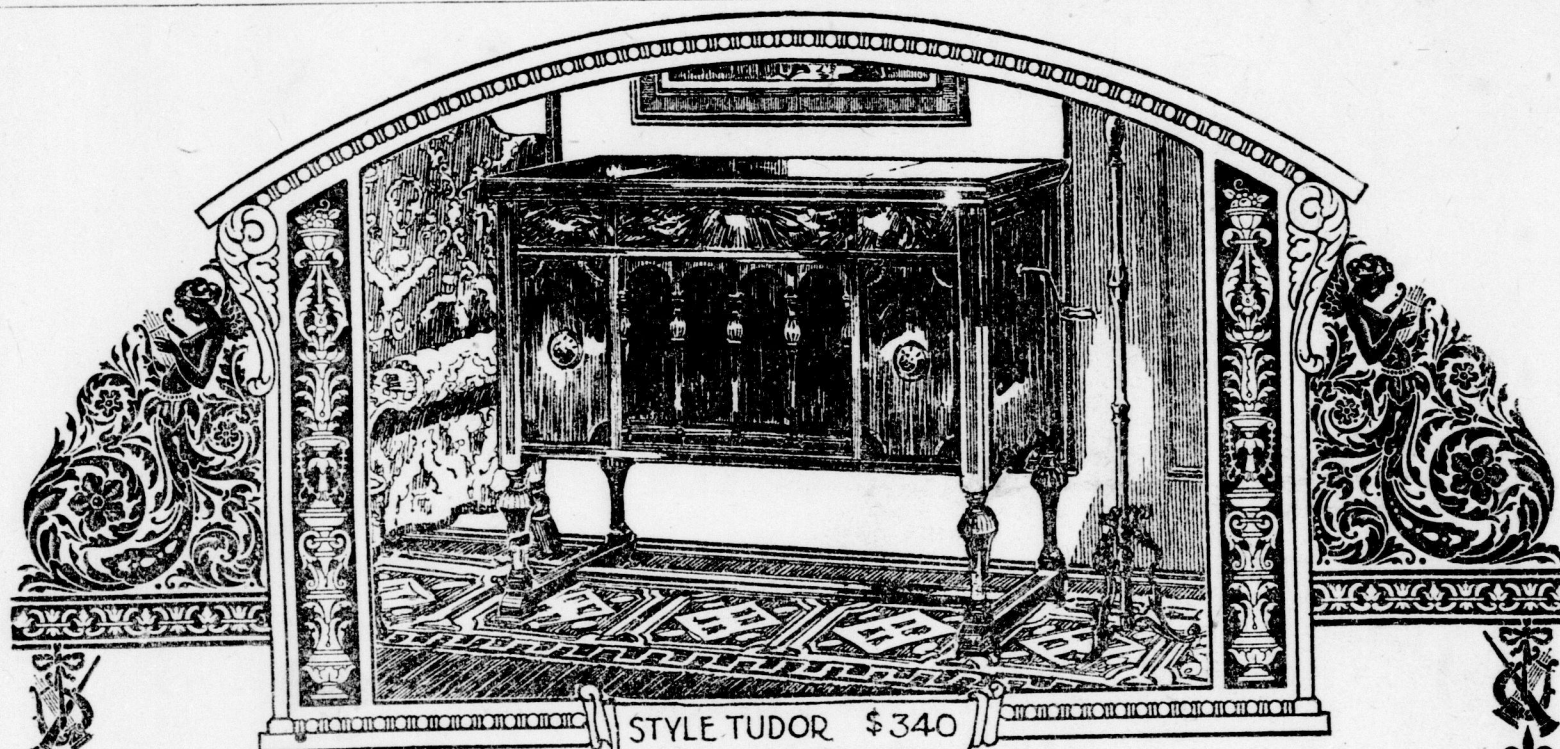

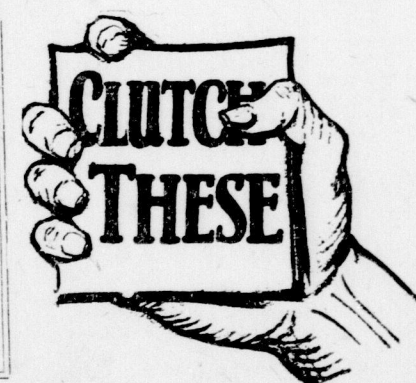
