The following statistics are of French origin, and pointed. Under Napoleon III the Crimean war cost France 200,000 men and 2 milliards of money; England 23,000 men and 5 milliards of money; Piedmont, 2,000 men and 175,000,000 francs of money; Russia, 6,000,000 men and 4 milliards of money; Turkey, 85,000 men and 40,000,000. In 1858 the Italian war cost France 80,000 men and 150,000,000. Austria, 120,000 men and 150,000,000. In the Mexican war France spent 500,000,000 money and 70,000 men.
