Several Members Speak on the Address in Reply to Speech From Throne.

Whole Sitting Devoted to the Debate and to Points of Order.

Legislative Chamber, March 13, 1902.
Mr. Speaker took the chair at 2 p.m.
After prayers by Rev. Dr. Campbell,
Mr. McBride questioned the government
as to their intention regarding the bringing
of the election in North Victoria.
The Hon. the Premier replied that she
would be issued as soon as possible.
Opposition members objected to the
vote on Mr. McBride's motion of Tues-
day not appearing on record in the
votes and Mr. Speaker held that there was no
reason why the vote should not be re-
corded.

Mr. Oliver called attention to the fact
that he did not vote on Mr. McBride's
motion in North Victoria election, as he
was not in the colony at the time.
The Hon. the Minister of Mines rose
to make a personal explanation. The
Victoria Times of Tuesday said, editorially:

"A correspondent directs attention to
a new development in our legislative
chamber. The Minister of Mines has
not in time in asserting his prerogative
possibly the seats in the ladies' gallery

House. By-and-by the common people,

province in which his interests are
centered. Then when some stranger
manages to catch a glimpse of the awe-
some chamber he may be told that
therein a celebrated knight of the
twentieth century, attended by a select
number of faithful retainers, has been
himself, enacts laws for the benefit of
his vassals. No one knows what may
happen. Unfortunately for this com-
munity, there are signs of rebellion
arising. Would it be believed, some
irreverent jocosist, that this country
possesses one of these sacred seats
and is still at large, appar-
ently utterly untroubled by the
penalties that may follow. The
Minister of Mines, however, is thor-
oughly understood his position, and
therefore appears to be quite dis-
interested in the proceedings. We
hope this revelation will not set
the democratic friend, the member for
Nelson."

TUGBOAT COTTON.

A Fair Class Being Raised Under Pro-

per Supervision.

Berlin, March 12.—The negroes of the

Tuskegee Normal and Industrial insti-

tute, who were engaged the latter part

of 1900 by the German Government to

teach the natives of Togoland, German

West Africa, how to grow cotton, ac-

cording to report of the colonial commis-

sioner, succeeded in producing cotton which

is graded on the Bremen exchange above

American middling. The Tuskegee ne-

groes have demonstrated that the land

of Togoland is suitable for cotton, of

which there is great abundance. The

only obstacle to the commercial value of

this product is transportation.
