

George Williams, Superintendent of B. C. Copper Co., Ltd., Is of This Opinion

"It is a great pity people in Victoria don't branch out," said George Williams, superintendent of the B. C. Copper company, Limited, yesterday. "You make engines and boats," he continued, "and the same factory could produce mining and smelting machinery. Slightly different patterns would be required but the appliances and tools are similar. During the past twelve months over \$1,000,000 was spent in improvements at the three Kootenay smelting centres of Green-wood, Grand Forks and Boundary Falls. Why does not Victoria make some of this machinery at all events? It would be profitable to those engaged in the industry and save mine owners paying freight and duty importing from the other side."

Copper company, which acquired the Mother Lode mine at Greenwood early in 1898, and has since operated it without intermission determined, a year ago, to more than treble the capacity of its sinelter at Greenwood. This work has just been completed as Mr. Williams was good enough to give some interesting particulars of the new institution.

While, during 1906, until some four months ago when the old smelter was torn down to be replaced by the larger one, the output of the mine was 600 tons a day, even now that is doubled and will be trebled before very long. It is safe to state that the Mother Lode will alone add over 300,000 tons of extra ore to the production of Kootenay during 1907.

The new smelter consists of three furnaces, having a capacity of at least foundations and any two of them are at present being operated heating about 200 tons of ore, but the three will be in operation very shortly. The smelter building is steel with stone foundations 120 feet long, the blast furnace room being 26 feet wide and the converter department 45 feet. There are also machine shops, black-smath shops, copper warehouses and many other necessary buildings.

The blowers for the furnaces are 300 feet long, built of 42-inch pipe, and there is every appliance for economical working. From the time the ore leaves

Each has a capacity of 25 tons, instead of about four, the usual size, and is self-propelling, having a motor to provide power to carry it to the dump. LARGEST BATTLESHIP ORDERED BY JAPAN

Will Build Fighting Machine of 22,000 Tons at Yokosuka

Steamer Empress of Japan, which arrived yesterday morning brought news that the Japanese naval authorities have decided to build a battleship of 22,000 tons, larger than any affoat. of 22,000 tons, larger than any afloat. Orders have been given to the construction bureau at Yokasukua where the Satsuma was built. Besides a squadron of warships, Japan has decided to send a battalion of Imperial Guards, with officers selected from those who took part in the war, to represent the army also at Jamestown next May. The squadron, which will include the Chitose and Tsukuba, or Iwate which may replace the Tsukuba, will leave Japan in February commanded by Vice Admiral Ijuin, and will go first to England srriving at Jamestown April 20. Admiral Togo will not accompany the squadron.
