Excitement Prevailed in Phillipines When Liner Was at the Island Port

With a heavy shipment of sulphur, and about 200 tons of general freight, to be landed at this port, the steamer Kumeric of the Weir fleet, Capt. Cowley, arrived at the outer wharf yesterday morning, being docked during a strong breeze. The trip across the Pacific was marked by dirty weather with strong northerly and southerly winds with heavy beam seas, and plenty of snow squalls throughout. Ottawa, March 17.—A. W. Fraser, K. C., of Ottawa, before the public accounts committee today in connection with the timber limits in western Canada, said that during his years of law practice in Ottawa his firm had had frequent occasions to put in tenders on behalf of clients. Theodore Burrows, M. P., had been a client before being elected to parliament.

In the matter of \$10,290 appearing in the auditor general's report as payment for timber berths, Mr. Fraser said he put in tenders for berths 11,272 and 11,292 for O. A. Robertson, of the Red Deer Lumber Company of Minneapolis. With their tenders he put in cheques for \$5,294 and \$5,195.

He had also put in \$3,600 to the Interior department for dues on several berths for the Imperial Pulp company. The only members he knew of this company were Sir Daniel McMillan, president: T. A. Burrows, M. P., and R. A. Pattinson, secretary.
