

### ARCHITECTS FOR CAUCHON'S PLAN

Ontario Association Indorses Track Elevation for London.

### CONVENTION CONCLUDED.

President Moore Re-Elected; J. M. Watt, Vice-President.

The Ontario Association of Architects, before concluding the final session of its thirty-first annual convention here yesterday, passed unanimously a resolution endorsing Mr. Noulan Cauchon's plan for track elevation and union terminal in London. Moved by K. Sheppard and W. R. Grigg, two prominent members of the association, the resolution expressing the feeling of the architects that their Ontario contemporary proposals would "insure the systematic, economic and beautiful development of the city." The plan was presented in detail at a Chamber of Commerce luncheon at noon, when the architects were guests. Mr. Cauchon illustrating his address with lantern slides.

Another resolution carried calls for practical training by the province of men for the architectural profession, and adoption of a measure similar to the Illinois Act regarding registration of architects. The association's thanks to speakers of the convention, to Mr. John M. Watt, the mayor and council, family of Commerce, Rotary Club and management of the L. & P. S. were also tendered by resolution.

### CONTROL PRACTICE.

The resolution regarding education of registration, which was sent on to the council with power to act, is as follows: "This convention, having heard the report of the representative on the Ontario Division of the Engineers' Institute, Canada, resolves that the practice of the profession of architecture should be based upon the educational qualification of the practitioner; on the protection of the public; the economic advantage to the community, and on the development of the manhood resources of the province; and whereas the Provincial Government supports educational institutions

to supply the province with men trained to handle the problems that arise in the community, and at present practice in all but the technical profession conserve the practice in the province for the men so trained. "Be it resolved, that this association take steps to have this practice extended by the Ontario Government to architects and the other technical professions, and

To this end recommends to the Government that it issue such legislation to control professional practice as is now in force in the State of Illinois as enacted in Ontario; and further, that the representatives of this association on the legislative committee of the Ontario Branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada be instructed to support only such recommendations from that committee as harmonize with the Illinois Act."

Election of three new members to the association council resulted in the naming of B. Frank Kelly, Hamilton; A. Stuart Alister, Brockville; and Forey P. Page, Toronto.

### THE OFFICERS.

Subsequently the council met and nominated officers for the coming year, as follows: President, Herbert E. Moore, Toronto (re-elected); first vice-president, R. K. Sheppard, Toronto; second vice-president, John M. Watt, London; treasurer, Gordon M. West, Toronto; registrar, J. P. Hynes, Toronto.

### A GARDEN CITY.

Special attention was drawn by the speaker both by his address and the moving pictures shown to the garden city of Letchworth, in England, which has a population now of 13,000, with 60 factories and workshops, all carrying on under conditions favorable to the health of the workpeople. In spite of the vast increase of cost—£1,000 as compared with £200—practically all the houses do not possess the charm of the earlier ones, in the opinion of Mr. Cromarty, who referred to the Italian-like simplicity. An interesting feature is the agricultural belt about the city, bringing produce close to the consumer and providing open spaces for outdoor games. It was decided to maintain control of the land in perpetuity for the benefit of the people, and the so-called unearned increment is conserved for the benefit of those who create it.

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### NO. 2 OPPOSES BELL INCREASE

No. 1 Committee to Consider Resolution To-Day. PAVING RECOMMENDED For Pipe Line Road From Wharncliffe Road to City Limits.

On motion of Aldermen Moorhead and Seabrook, No. 2 committee last night unanimously went on record as being opposed to the increase in telephone rates. The city clerk was instructed to send the resolution to No. 1 committee for consideration this afternoon. Ald. Moorhead pointed out that the utilities under public control in Ontario are being reduced in cost, and he thought that the telephone rates should not be raised at this time.

### ENGLAND'S GARDEN CITIES PICTURED

Canadian Houses Still Better, Mr. Cromarty Says.

### INTERNATIONAL PLANS.

Mr. Cauchon Shows Views of Ancient Rome Recreated.

At a public meeting in the Auditorium last evening, following the close of the Ontario architects' convention, Mr. W. D. Cromarty, of Ottawa, gave a most instructive illustrated lecture presenting something of the proceedings of the interlarded housing and town planning conference, held in London, England, last June, as well as visits made by the delegates then to various housing projects in England. The congress, attended by 700 delegates representing 20 nations, was held in Westminster Hall, the Canadian delegates being Mr. Cromarty and Mr. Thomas Adams.

Herbert E. Moore, of Toronto, president of the Architects' Association, introduced the speaker, who first dwelt upon his impressions of the gathering. It seemed that everyone spoke at once, owing to the fact that so many languages were naturally used. The main outcome of the convention was the passing of a resolution favoring a national movement to erect model houses and to make extensive improvements in the housing plans within the next 20 years.

Mr. J. M. Watt was also honored by nomination to the council of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada, the other members being Messrs. Wickson, Eymont, and the president and past president ex-officio.
