



WEIRD SYSTEM OF BOOKKEEPING

Government Shows Improvement While Debt Climbs.

DRAYTON AND LOW DEBATE

Minister Predicts Liberal Majority Over All.

OTTAWA, July 30.—(By Canadian Press.)—Hon. Thomas A. Low, minister of trade and commerce, and Sir Henry Drayton, M. P., former Conservative minister of finance, met in public debate yesterday at a picnic held at Douglas, Ont., in the former's constituency. Any fireworks anticipated did not materialize.

Mr. Low declared that at the time the present Government came into office revenues were falling, unemployment was rife, expenditures were increasing and the national debt was rapidly expanding. The Canadian dollar was then at a discount of 15 per cent, he stated, and victory bonds were selling at only 90. With four years of the King administration, declared Mr. Low, the budget was now balanced.

The Canadian dollar was no longer at a discount and victory bonds stood at 104. In the last five years 150,000 Canadians had returned to Canada. Mr. Low declared that in 1921 the trade balance was against Canada, while by March last there was a favorable balance of \$24,000,000. He predicted a clear majority for the present Government over all parties at the next general election.

Sir Henry declared that "Mackenzie King is as big a joker as my friend, Tom Low." Canadians were not satisfied with present conditions, Mr. Low, in discussing the question of the exodus of Canadians to the United States, did not mention the fact that it had been estimated that the number of citizens who had left this country and had not returned.

The King Government, stated Sir Henry, never had and never would balance the budget, although it still persisted in misleading. By a weird system of bookkeeping the Government had endeavored to show that it had brought about an improvement in the financial standing of the country, whereas, as a matter of fact, in two years there had been added to the national debt the trifling sum of \$118,000,000 or so.

Many factories, he declared, had ceased to function in Canada, resulting in unemployment.

TIME TO AID IN NAVAL DEFENSE

Dominions Must Do So Or Dispenze With Imperial Protection.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., July 30.—(Canadian Press Cable via Reuters.)—The Dominion Times newspaper reports of New Zealand in discussing the naval policy of the dominions and states that the time is now here when the British dominions must either accept their full responsibility in the matter of naval defense of the empire or dispenze with the measure of protection on which they have hitherto relied.

"Great Britain is merely showing an inclination to withhold, under extreme conditions, the naval expenditure which the dominions have been withholding without Great Britain's consent," the Dominion says with regard to the cruiser program which has had a difficult passage in the British House of Commons.

HAMILTON YOUNG MAN, HIT BY CAR, DIES

HAMILTON, Ont., July 30.—Thomas H. Muir, 26, died last evening at his home as the result of being struck by an automobile driven by H. L. G. Westland, a local lawyer, as he was riding his bicycle at the corner of Ottawa street and Campbell avenue. Muir's injuries were not believed to be serious, and he was taken to his home following the accident, where an examination showed only cuts and bruises, and a fractured jaw. An ambulance had just arrived to take him to the hospital when he died.

RUSSIA LEADS CANADA

"Jimmy" Simpson's View of "Social Advance" Expressed in London.

LONDON, July 30.—(Canadian Press Cable.)—James Simpson, Toronto, who presided this morning at the Empire Labor conference which is being held in the House of Commons, devoted his opening address to the contribution made by Canada to the social well-being of the world.

Mr. Simpson described briefly the advance Canada has made in the public ownership of railways and hydro-electric power and expressed opinion that Canada had made the greatest contribution of any country in the world to social advance in the past decade, except Russia, in the taking over by the Government at Ottawa of the railway system now known as the Canadian National Railways.

Mr. Simpson pointed out that there was a considerable drift of investment capital from Great Britain to the United States.

PROPERTY TRANSFER NOT YET COMPLETED

Department is Slow in Handing School Site Over To Board.

Although the Board of Education is planning for its new East End Collegiate on the Ontario Hospital property, the site has not yet been transferred, it became known yesterday. Secretary W. A. Tanner was instructed by the chairman of the board to write Hon. Lincoln Goldie's department immediately, asking that the transfer details be arranged as quickly as possible.

The necessary check and voucher providing for the payment of \$25,000 for the property has been prepared and sent to City Treasurer Bell, authorizing payment of the purchase price, and, as far as is known, has been sent to Toronto. In the meantime, however, the official transfer of the property has not yet been made.

Sir Adam Beck was appealed to the other day and he communicated with Toronto. The secretary was instructed by the chairman to write yesterday again asking for as early settlement of the problem.

County Officials Wait Word From City Regarding New Agreement.

County officials are waiting to hear from the city regarding a renewal of the agreement for the care of Middlesex

patients in local hospitals. John Stuart, clerk, states as yet they have received no word, although a committee of both municipalities met some time ago to confer on the matter.

This agreement, made for a period of five years, expired in December, 1922. Indigent patients are cared for by an agreement between the city and county at a price per day set by statute.

Mr. Stuart states the county is

anxious to have the matter settled and would appreciate some action on the part of city authorities.
