City Cattle Market, Toronto, Nov. 14. Receipts to-day were 170 cars, with 2,600 head of cattle, 2,700 sheep and lambs, 500 hogs and 220 calves.

Considering the heavy receipts of cattle at this market yesterday and to-day the market was a fair one, prices holding steady, though trading was at times a little slow. But slow and all as it may have been anyone looking for cheap cattle, except of the very poorest grades, found he had a very difficult quest before him. There was a good all-round demand for butcher cattle, not alone for choice quality, but the medium qualities found ready purchasers at fair prices, according to condition. For feeding cattle there is still a good outside demand, particularly from farmers looking for stock for winter feeding. One or two of the buyers who have of late been in the market for distillery feeders announce that they are now filled up, but this still leaves a good market to be supplied with feeding cattle of good quality.

The Death of Hilda Edith Thompson.

(From Welland Telegraph, Nov. 7.) The pen is seldom called upon to write so melancholy an occurrence as this brief record of the passing of Hilda Edith Thompson, youngest daughter of Rev. James Thompson and Mrs. Thompson, on Friday. Hilda was taken ill the previous Saturday, but it was not until the middle of the week the serious symptoms developed of broncho pneumonia. Dr. Davis called in consultation Doctor Colbeck of Welland, Doctor Fotheringham and Doctor McPhedran, of Toronto, and everything possible was done, but the angel of death could not be stayed and at the midnight hour on Friday the spirit passed.

This death has raised the pall of sadness in many hearts. Hilda had barely passed her sixteenth year. With old and young her cheery smile and ways of pleasantness had won her countless friends. At school, in social spheres and in the associations of the church she will be deeply missed, as well as the home that is now made desolate.

The funeral took place yesterday, service being conducted by the Rev. Mr. Lyon of Fonthill. The pall-bearers were five brothers of Mrs. Thompson, Messrs. Brennan, of Hamilton, and a brother-in-law, Mr. Potts, of Toronto. The remains were taken to Hamilton for interment in the city cemetery. Service at the cemetery chapel was conducted by His Lordship Bishop Clark.

The heartfelt sympathy of the community goes to the bereaved parents and brother and sister in their unexampled sorrow.

OBITUARY.

After a very brief illness, Thos. Henderson passed away October 27th, at the family residence near Wyoming. Deceased was born in the county of Monaghan, Ireland, in the year 1841, coming to Canada in 1862. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Wm. Leach, Warwick. Sarnia's grand new rink where can be played six sheets of ice is one of the finest and commodious curling rinks in Western Ontario a rival of the Echo rink, of Guelph. With this splendid new rink Sarnia curlers can give the visiting Scottish curlers a great reception this season. It is their intention to open the new rink with a Bonspiel and invitations will be sent to all the clubs to participate. This Bonspiel and the Petrolia Bonspiel and the big Bonspiel at London on January 8th, 1912, will keep things at high water mark in the curling line. Reduction in Price of Cement.

In November, 1910, it was announced that the price of cement had been reduced. That announcement was admitted by many as corroborative of the opinion that the merging of the cement interests in Canada would prove a good thing for the public. The theory of a consolidation such as the Canada Cement Company is that the consolidated interests are in a position to effect economy in production and distribution. That the Canada Cement Company are working upon the idea of increasing consumption by lowering prices, rather than curtailing production and obtaining higher prices, is clearly shown by its President's report to the Shareholders at the last Annual Meeting, when he stated: "It is confidently expected that the increased demand and increased output will result in further savings in the cost of manufacture and distribution, and it is the policy of your Directors to give your customers the benefit of these reductions." This is further evidenced by the announcement, which was made on November 1st, 1911, of a still further reduction in the price of cement. The reduction in some districts is 10c. per barrel, and in others 5c. On the whole it will probably average 7c. per barrel. This reduction—with the reduction made last year—means a very large saving to the cement consumers of Canada. We trust that the expectations of lower cost voiced by the President of the Canada Cement Company, will be realized again next year, so that the Company may continue its policy of giving the benefit of these reductions to its customers—thereby enlarging the uses to which Cement may be put.
