The Forest Fair a Fine Success

Forest, Sept. 26.—The Forest Fair, held yesterday and to-day, was a big success. The exhibits in all classes were large, live stock and fruit making an extra good showing. The ideal weather brought out a big crowd to-day, and grounds and buildings were thronged. The receipts amounted to over \$900, being considerably in excess of last year.

The Parkhill Fair

Parkhill, Sept. 26.—Between three and four thousand people visited the Parkhill Agricultural Society's fall exhibition to-day. The attendance undoubtedly would have been greater, but throughout the morning rain fell incessantly, and it was feared that the fair would be marred completely. But about 2 o'clock a strong and decided chilly north wind scattered the clouds and the sun and

wind quickly dried the track and the roads making travel much easier than anticipated. In consequence farmers for miles around assembled to make the occasion a red-letter day. From every standpoint the fair was a success.

Death of Mr. W. H. McMahon

WYOMING, Sept. 26.—The death of William H. McMahon, which occurred at his home here at 2 o'clock this morning, removes from Wyoming one of its most prominent residents. Lambton County loses a citizen who had been connected with its municipal affairs for upwards of thirty years. The deceased was born near Kingston on April 21, 1840. In 1861 he removed to Enniskillen Township, and purchased 100 acres, now comprising the southeast corner of the town of Petrolia, which he cleared and devoted a part of his time teaming crude oil from Oil Springs to Wyoming, prior to the construction of the Petrolia branch of the G. T. R. He removed to Plympton in April, 1874, where he purchased the west half of lot 27, concession 3, and followed the occupation of stock dealer. Seven years ago he sold his farm and purchased the residence of Mr. J. E. Anderson, on London street, this village, where he has since resided as a retired gentleman, but devoted a part of his time to the buying of stock until a short time prior to his death. The deceased filled the position of reeve of Plympton for several years, and also warden of the county. He was a life-long active Conservative in politics and opposed the late J. F. Lister as a candidate for the Dominion Parliament 33 years ago, but was defeated. He was a prominent member of the Masonic and Orange orders in the latter of which he had attained the "scarlet" degree, and was a charter member of Wainstead Lodge, L.O.J., and a past county master. He was a member of the Orange Order for about 50 years and a member of the Methodist church for 28 years. He was united in marriage 48 years ago to Mrs. Orson Armstrong, whose maiden name was Miss Mary Metcalfe, who with her two children by her first husband, Orson Armstrong, of Sarnia, and Mrs. Angus Kerr, of Detroit, survive.

The funeral was held from the family residence on Sunday afternoon to the village cemetery, was one of the largest ever seen here. Services were conducted by Rev. J. W. Pring, pastor of the Methodist Church, and Rev. L. W. Reid, of Theodora, a former pastor and family friend. Four brothers and two cousins acted as pallbearers. An immense crowd of brother Orangemen and Masons, of which orders the deceased was a member for many years, attended. A special train was run from Sarnia to accommodate the brethren and friends from that town.
